STUDENTS/ JUBILANT AT EUGENE

Eugene, Friday, Nov. 30, 1906
Naturally, students here are jubilant over the result at Multnomah game on Thanksgiving. Never before has U. of O. beaten the Portland club and for ten years they had not even scored against the players of the "winged M." Thus Oregon closed a most successful season, without losing a single game, and having been scored against only twice. The fact that Williamette beat O. A. C. while both Oregon and Multnomah have defeated the Salem college deprives the Agricultural College of its claim to the Northwest Championship. Even Pullman cannot claim it against Oregon as comparison of scores show.

Oregon is this year doubly champion, her Varsity team having won the Northwest championship and her second team being secondary champions of the state.

Eugene High School defeated Columbia University at football on Thanksgiving Day by the score of 11 to 0. The game was played on Kincaid field.

President Campbell, who has been east was in Portland to see the game, and is expected home Saturday.

Thanksgiving and the victory over Multnomah were fittingly celebrated at the dormitory by a royal dinner. In addition to all the usual delicacies of the season there was ice cream which the mildness of the weather made most agreeable.

The University will have a basketball team this year. The schedule of game has not yet been made but will doubtless include contests with all the near-by colleges with possibly a trip into Washington. The tryout will be held in the near future. Among the most promising aspirants for the team is James Neill of La Grande.

CLASS SCRAP

Last Tuesday morning the freshmen were surprised to see a banner with the numerals of the sophomore class floating over Deady Hall. Watching their chances they caught the sophs off their guard and succeeding in bringing the flag to the ground where they surrounded it and burned it amid shouts of triumph, while the few sophomores on the camps looked on in chagrin. Thinking themselves victorious the freshmen gave themselves over to rejoicing. But meanwhile the sophomores had been at work and soon he freshmen saw a second flag floating where the first had been and guarded by some 25 or 30 members of Class '09.
