FAMILIAR LANDMARK NO MORE

Logging on the Sandridge might appear to some as a fairy tale, but such could be seen on Dec. 5 on the place of L. Billings of Imbler, with no timber in sight in either direction for three miles!

The logging consisted of drawing into the wood yard of what was known as the Lone Pine, which all old settlers of the valley will readily remember. It stood on a sand knoll on what was known as the Lone Pine or Jess Imbler place adjoining Imbler town site.

Mr. Billings says Indians have made inquiries about the famous old landmark. He has drawn in nine logs from 2 feet to 16 inches in thickness and from 12 to 14 feet long, and which is only about half the tree, the remaining part being over a steep bank on the river.

Nine years ago while Walter Pierce owned the place, lightning split its massive forks apart and hurled it to the ground, where it has laid till the present time; the last act of the famous old landmark which would never escape the eye of any person entering the valley from either direction.

As a rule, these doctors carry the study of anatomy much further than the allopath, the electric or the homopath. Even the most experienced surgeon knows nothing of anatomy in comparison with the educated Osteopath.—Medical Talk.
