THIS LAW NOT NEEDED IN OREGON

Albany, Dec. 17—Owing to the great demand for frogs and their consequent decreasing destruction a bill has been prepared and will be immediately presented to the legislature to prevent their total extermination. The bill provides for an annual close season during spawning time and exacts penalties to prevent the destruction of the spawn. At present there is no statutory check on the destruction of frogs and the fish and Game Protective Association who are moving on the matter are demanded that it be made unlawful to kill frogs during certain months of the year.
