THE MESSAGE IS POINTED

(Continued From First Page)

Under no circumstances there was an alternative, for the usefulness of the army would be at an end if it was permitted that such outrage be committed with impunity. In short the evidence proves conclusively that a number of soldiers engaged in a deliberate, concerted attack, cold blooded and cowardly, for the purpose of terrorizing the community, to kill or injure men, women and children, in their homes and beds, or on the streets, at an hour of the night when concerted and effective resistance or defense was out of the question and when detection by identification of criminals in United States uniforms was well nigh impossible.

A blacker deed never stained the annals of the army, supplanted by another, only less black in the shape of a successful conspiracy of silence for the purpose of shielding those taking part in the original conspiracy and murder. These were soldiers, not school boys on a frolic, full grown men, wearing the uniform of the United States army, sworn to uphold the laws of the United States under every obligation. Their oath was not merely to refrain from criminality, but with the sternest rigor to hunt down the criminality and crime they committed or connived at as murder.

The people call this discharge punishment. I deny this because, as punishment it is inadequate. As to being an effort to arouse sympathy for men of long service, these are the men who should be punished most severely. Upon the long service men should rest the honor of the service and should do all in their power to reveal criminals. Officers or enlisted men, white or black, under similar circumstances would be treated exactly the same. The precedents are many.

During the civil war, the sixtieth Ohio was summarily discharged because they were mutinous and worthless. General Grant mustered out two officers and fined all of the men of the Twentieth Illinois for a raid on a store, the offense being much lighter than I had to deal with.

In the fiscal year ending last June, the War department discharged 552 enlisted men without trial, thirty of them for misconduct, many others by subordinate military officers. So much for the military side of the case.

I wish now to speak from the stand point of the race question. It is of the most importance to all of our people, that we deal with each man on his merits as a man, not as members of a certain race. That we judge him by his conduct, not by his color. If the colored men elect to stand by criminals of their own race, because they are of their own race, they lay up for themselves the day of reckoning. Any conduct by the colored people tending to shield the evil doer, because he is of his own race, means degradation of the race. It means the damage to the white man but it means the ruin of the black race. In this I do not claim as a favor but challenge as a right the support of every citizen of this country, whatever his color, who has the spirit and genuine far sighted patriotism.
