The Oregon legislature, the Moyer-Haywood trials in Idaho and Congress, all promise to furnish the newspapers a great deal of interesting matter during the next two months.

It is just possible that Senator John B. Foraker thinks that he sees an opportunity to side track President Roosevelt as a candidate in 1908, thru his attack on the President in removing those colored regiments. It is more than probable that before he gets thru with his tactics, history will record the fact that Foraker was one of the main causes that led up to Roosevelt's renomination. Foraker belongs to the old school of politicians and they forget that opposition to just such leaders, in the past, has made Roosevelt what he is today.

Gov. Chamberlain, in his speech at the Commercial Club last Spring asking the people to vote for him without regard to party, and as a reason for asking this, he pointed to the fact, that last year, the state taxes of this and other counties were very low compared with previous years, and the governor claimed all the credit for this reduction in taxes. The Observer pointed out, a day or two after the Governor made this remarkable claim, that the lowness of the tax levy was due to the fact that the main appropriation bill was being held up by a referendum, and that state officials had not levied any tax to pay a large amount of these appropriations, and that the next levy of state taxes would have to be increased above the usual levy to pay for these appropriations. Some of the governor's henchmen took offense at this contention of the Observer. Word now comes from Salem to the effect that the state taxes this year will have to be nearly twice as high as last year, and that this is due to the fact that last year no levy was made to pay a large amount of the appropriations made by the last legislature and that these have to be paid now. The Governor ought now to explain how he came to be guilty of such a demagogic plea as this. If the Governor undertakes to discuss the tax question he will hardly take the position that he did in his campaign speeches. Honesty is the best policy for governors as well as for other people.

Several feelers have been sent out but the popular feeling is so strong that there seems no probability of the schemers being successful. This being the first opportunity of electing a senator under the new law, it is paramount that the program as intended be carried out to the letter. The principal is at stake, not the man upon whom the honor is to be conferred. The people by a large majority have taken this means to elect their senators by a direct vote. They have done so, now let the legislature establish this custom for all the time to come.
