SPORTS

There was an abbreviated football game in the city yesterday. In reality the less said about an occurrence of this nature, the better.

The OBERVER does not propose to devote a column to the question of whether or not Umpire Hockenberry was justified in ruling Walters of Island City, who was playing right half for Elgin, out of the game for unnecessary roughness. Hockenberry was the mutual selection for umpire, and being duly selected he had the right to make the ruling he did, and both teams were forced to abide by his decisions.

The game opened with every player in Elgin's team trying to get off side. The umpire penalized Elgin twice in succession for that offence. Then La Grande got the ball and its players started the same tactics. A penalty quickly stopped that sort of work with the home team too. Then the game was on in earnest and no prettier exhibition of good football could be desired, aside from the fact that one or two of the Elgin men persisted in rough playing. Be all that as it may, but what disgusted every spectator there, what disgusted every man, woman and child that has since heard of the game, is the way Elgin quit.

It happened suddenly. The umpire disqualified Walters, giving his reasons. The referee ordered the substitution of a sub, and in less time than it takes to tell it, the Elgin aggregation, headed by principal Tucker and captain McGruder, trailed off the field like a bunch of babies. The act was a reflection of "Kids" of ill-tiesness, decidedly unsportsmanlike.

The act was absolutely without excuse. Had Walters been a star player, had he been the only real man of the team, there would even then have been no excuse for quitting. But Walters is not. He is only an ordinary player with clever feet who plays the game hard. Had Elgin acted like men and stayed with the game and had been beaten by a score of a hundred to nothing, La Grande to a man would have said "Elgin is game, it stays with the game, and in spite of adversities hangs on until the whistle blows."

An incident like this puts a damper on sports. However La Grande cannot be blamed for any phase of the distasteful fiasco which robbed spectators of their money. It was impossible for the management to give the money back. The ticket taker could not under any circumstances distinguish the gentlemen and ladies who paid their admissions from those who sneaked thru the break in the fence. There was a hundred dollar crowd and something over fifty in the coffers, of which Elgin received one half, as per agreement.
