TEHAUTEPEC ROAD FINISHED

(Scripps News Association)
 Tehautepec, Mex., Dec. 26.—The Tehautepec road is finished and will be opened for interoceanic traffic in a few days. It will be some time however before the Coahuacalcos or the Salina Cruz works will be finished. The many steamship companies operating from New York and other points on the Atlantic and from European ports to Panama and South American Pacific Coast ports, stop at Coahuacalcos. The same condition will prevail on the Pacific side, and, in all, the new road will have a vast volume of tonnage to handle. The Hawaiian trade alone will amount to 600,000 tons annually as the trade develops two or three more tracks will be laid across the Isthmus. The American Hawaii Steamship Company, which now operates a fleet of 11 cargo steamers, 12,000 carrying capacity, is having three additional ships built at the San Francisco Shipyards. The regular fleet of the company and the new steamers will be diverted from the present route, from New York and Philadelphia via the straits of Magellan to San Francisco, San Diego, Puget Sound ports and Hawaii Islands to the Tehautepec.
