A FEW FACTS ABOUT THE FEET

IMPORTANCE OF THE ARCH AND INCREASING FREQUENCY OF ITS COLLAPSE—THE POSSIBLE REMEDIES

We quote the following from the New York Press as indicating the great importance of care of the feet:
"Unquestionably the arch of the foot is a certain indication of character and habits. The dandies of all countries have been at much pains to exhibit a high instep. It is a sign of gentility, activity, energy and social prowess. Flat foot is really a deformity. It is a matter of so much consequence in England and some other foreign countries that it debars persons from public service or even from engagements in positions where activity is needed. No flatfooted man is accepted as a sailor. In the Southern United States to say that the hollow of a man's foot will make a hole in the ground is the grossest insult. It is a relegation to the limbo of tumble-bugs."

"The hollow of the foot is quite a wonderful nerve center, quite as important as the palm of the hand, which is also the hollow. A celebrated French countess gave her entire fortune to Napoleon III in the war with Prussia, and took the field as surgeon, devoting all her care to the feet of the soldiers. She said to the commissary department: 'You keep the troops well fed; I'll see that they are able to walk.' It was not her fault that Frederick and Bismark were successful in overthrowing the Man of Sedan. Her soldiers marched admirably."

INCREASE OF FLAT-FOOT

The disease known as flat-foot, which is simply the breaking down of the arch of the foot is receiving more attention today than ever before, for there can be no doubt that the number of cases of it and the amount of suffering from it are steadily on the increase. This is largely due to the amount of standing necessitated by modern occupations although this explanation does not quite suffice, many people becoming afflicted who are not engaged in any such occupation.

Whatever may be the cause of the increase in the number of cases, it is the fact that none of the devices designed to cure the trouble have achieved much success. A supporting arch built into the shoe is of course of service, making the sufferer more comfortable and rendering it possible for him to get about as he would be unable to do otherwise. But such supports do nothing toward curing the trouble and the reason is quite evident.

No cure can be effected without finding and removing the cause of the failing strength of the arch of the foot.

The great sciatic and the anterior crural are the two big nerves which, with their branches, constitute the nerve supply to the legs and feet. It is their force which gives to the lower limbs and feet their proper tone, proper action, proper vigor; and equally true is that nearly every failing in the limbs or feet indicates something wrong with one of these great nerves.

WHERE THE NERVES SUFFER MOST

These nerves are made up of strands which leave the spine at well known points in the lower part of the back, and it is here that the cause of any trouble with these nerves is most likely to be found, as afterward their courses lie chiefly among soft tissues. Any spinal misadjustment which causes pressure or strain upon these nerves would at once lessen their efficiency; and a distant point, like the arch of the foot, would be the first to feel the resultant ill effects.

Osteopaths are scoring great success in the treatment of flat-foot, and their work in these cases usually lies chiefly at the spine, where the nerves are most likely to suffer. Sometimes, however, local work at the foot itself is also required; and the Osteopath, being just as familiar with the anatomy of the foot as with that of the spinal column, is always able to detect such a need and administer just the treatment that is best—Right Way.

MODEL OF STATUE FINISHED

New York, Dec 27—A number of sculptors and art students assembled at the studio of Frederic Ernest Trieber, McDougall Alley, here today, at a private view of the model of the bronze statue to be erected in Peoria, Illinois, of Col Robert E. Ingersoll, the famous agnostic. It will be cast in bronze early next spring, and will be ready for unveiling in Glen Oak Park, Peoria, on the anniversary of Col Ingersoll's death, July 21.
Mr. Trieber is a Peoria man, and was acquainted with the late Col Ingersoll. He is an artist of note, a graduate of the Royal Academy of Florence, Italy, and was instructor in the San Luca Royal Academy at Rome.
The statue is one-third larger than life.

MILLIONS FOR CANADIAN RAILROADS
