### BONI IN OFFICE

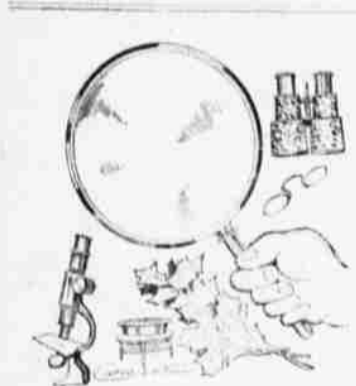
