LECTURE ON CHEMULPO

Bishop D. H. Moore of the Methodist Episcopal church began his work in Eastern Asia with the Boxer outbreak, and closed it amid the exciting scenes of the Russo-Japanese War. He disimbarked from the Russian transport, Sungari, one day and she was destroyed the next. For weeks there was great uncertainty as to his safety.

He witnessed the seafight off Chemulpo with which the war began. Before returning to this country, he was compelled to tell the story in five of the principal cities of Japan; here he has told it from Alaska to the Gulf, and from ocean to ocean.

Bishop Moore will give his famous lecture "Chemulpo" in the Methodist church Monday, January 14. Tickets 50 Children 26 cents.
