PURCHASE CANADIAN LUMBER LAND

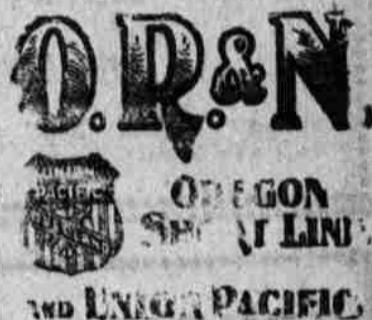

Vancouver, B. C. Jan. 8—A firm of timber merchants trading in St. Paul Mo., and Minneapolis, Minn., have had transferred from the government fifty two sections of land on Queen Charlotte Island in the sound of that name in British Columbia. In the properties there is over one billion feet of spruce, cedar, and hemlock. By the terms of the concession the Canadian government reserves a royalty of so much per thousand feet on the timber as cut. Work of cutting the timber will commence in a few days.
