

# HOW TO DIG ARTESIAN WELLS

It is interesting and instructive to witness the process whereby an artesian well is constructed. The well diggers that have the contract for locating an artesian well for the O. R. & N. at the railroad yards, have reached a depth of 150 feet, having been in actual operation seven and one half days. They are still in the gravel-sand stratum which they entered at the surface.

While the various strata are pliable, the piping will be a ten inch side. The drill is about six inches in diameter and when it has worked its way into the ground some distance, a pan is let down which scoops the mud. When this operation has increased the depth of the hole about 30 feet, the descent of this casing, that each time the hammer falls, there is no perceptible drop of the pipe. Should the diggers encounter a hard stratum the size of the casing will reduce conform with the size of the hole drilled, for the casing cannot be forced thru rock. According to the contract, the well is only a little more than one tenth finished.

## Dry Farm Congress

For the first time in the history of America, a general movement has been inaugurated toward the rapid development and settlement of the dry land sections of the west. Acting on the suggestion of many Colorado's business men, Governor Jesse F. McDonald of that state has called the "Trans-Missouri Dry Farming Congress" to meet in Denver on the 24th and 25th of this month. The call has been sent to every state west of the Missouri river and assurances have already been received that delegates will come, with state sanction, from practically all of the sixteen common-wealths included in the call.

The purpose of the congress which will meet in Denver this month is, first of all, to form a permanent, educational interstate organization somewhat on the line of the National Irrigation congress, and second, to afford a full and free discussion of the principles of scientific soil culture, and of their development in the west. Speakers will be present from every state west of the Missouri river.

The County Court of Baker county has appointed five men to represent that community. Umatilla county will be represented by ten delegates, duly appointed by the court of that county.

County Judge Henry on Union county has as yet received no invitation from the organizers of this congress, to appoint delegates to attend. However this invitation may be forthcoming, and should it, the court will no doubt act promptly. Pendleton and Baker City papers infer that many will go who have not been authorized to attend as delegates.

## Died

HAMMOCK—In this city Thursday, Jan. 10, 1907 Ephrem Hammock, aged sixty two years. The funeral will be held at Summerville, Saturday afternoon at two o'clock.

The deceased was one of the early pioneers of Union county, having arrived here in the fall of 1865, and resided here continuously since that date. For many years he was known as one of the leading farmers in this valley, but for the past number of years has been a resident of La Grande. He leaves to mourn his death two sisters and four brothers, three daughters and two sons. The daughters are: Mrs. J. A. Rogers, of this city, Mrs. W. R. Groat of North Powder, and Mrs. Jane Titzer of Portland. The sons, Richard and William reside in this city. During his many years residence in this valley he has made many friends who will long remember him as one always ready to accord a hearty welcome to friend or stranger and extend the right hand of good fellowship alike to rich or poor.

By his death the ranks of that sturdy class of pathfinders, and empire builders has been reduced by one, and again we are made to realize that "Man is of earth and must to the earth return."

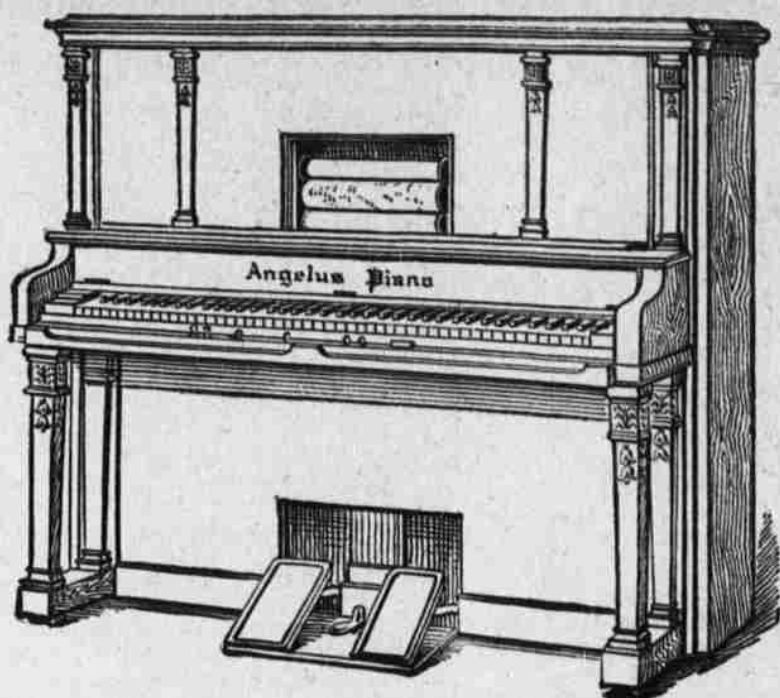
