CHEMULPO

What an American Saw of the First Battle of the Russo-Japanese War.

Under the Auspices of the Epworth League In the Methodist Church MONDAY EVENING, JANUARY 14, 1907

Bishop Moor began his work in Eastern Asia with the Boxer Outbreak, and closed it amid the exciting scenes of the Russo-Japanese War. He disembarked from the Russian transport Sungari one day, and she was destroyed the next. For weeks there was great uncertainty as to his safety.

He witnessed the sea-fight of Chemulpo with which the war began. Before returning to this country he was compelled to tell the story in five of the principal cities of Japan; here he has told it from Alaska to the Gulf, and from ocean to ocean.
