THE COLDEST THIS WINTER

Last night was the coldest night this winter, according to Weather Observer W. A. Worstell. In November the thermometer dropped to five above but last night the mercury went to 2 above. Saturday afternoon at four o'clock the government instrument registered 32 degrees and at six-thirty the same evening it was down to 12 degrees, a drop of twenty degrees. The maximum drop Saturday night was 3 degrees. Yesterday, the coldest was 7 degrees, the warmest, 14. With the approach of night the thermometer again began its descent and some time during the night reached 2 degrees above. At nine this morning it was still at five degrees.
