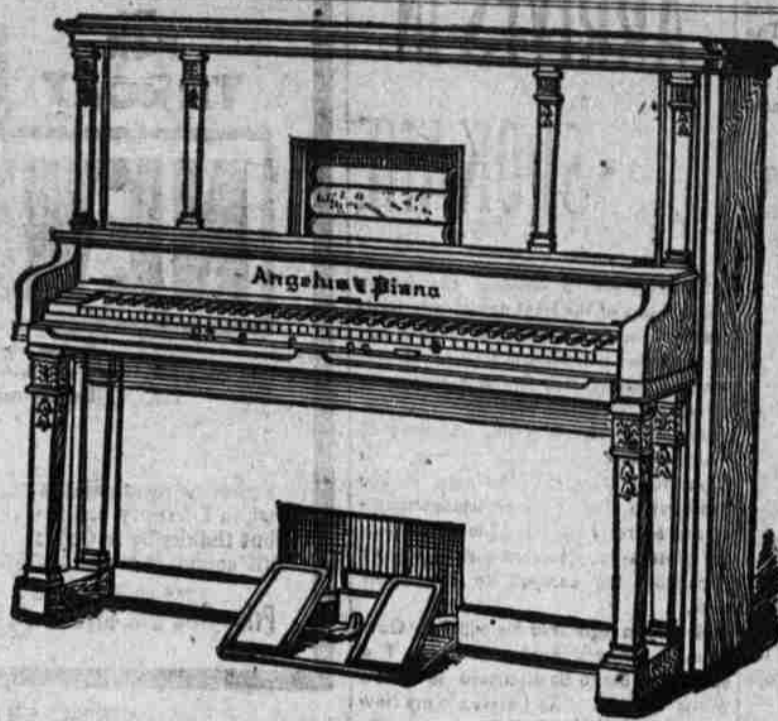

SHELLEY MANUSCRIPT

London, Jan 18—Sothebys have completed the sale of the library of the late Dr Richard Garnett keeper of the Printed books in the British museum and trustee of the National Portrait Gallery. For \$18,000 Mr Stevens an American Art and Curio collector secured the note books and a number of original manuscripts of the poet Shelley. It is stated that Mr Stevens will present his purchase to the Columbia University of New York.

NEW FRUIT LINE FORMED

Chicago, Jan. 18—The Pacific Fruit Express, a corporation with a capitalization of \$12,000,000 has been formed by the Harriman lines for the purpose of handling their refrigerator car business. When present orders for equipment have been filled the new corporation will own 6,500 cars of the most modern type, and will be one of the biggest concerns engaged in the operation of fast freight lines in the country. More than \$10,500,000 of the company's capitalization will represent expenditures for cars.
