**BISHOP  
MOORE'S  
LECTURE**

Those who braved the storm last night to hear Bishop D. H. Moore lecture on "What an American saw at the first battle of the Russo-Japanese war" were more than rapid.

Bishop Moore for four years was head of the Methodist foreign missionary work in China, Japan, Korea, spending six months of each year in China, four months in Japan and two months in Korea. He was in China at the time of the Boxer uprising and paid a glowing tribute to the faithfulness of the Chinese who had been converted to the Christian religion during that trying period.

The first part of the lecture was devoted to the peoples within his jurisdiction, especially interesting from the fact his long residence there made him perfectly familiar with the subject. The description of the first great battle of the recent war brought out his great oratorical power and one could imagine they could see the conflict and after the colors had been struck on the Russian man of war, the later blowing up the vessels. Bishop Moore served during the Civil war of the United States and the thundering of cannon was not by any means new to him. In company with an American general they rowed into the harbor and secured the name plate of the manufacturer of one of the large Spanish vessels as a souvenir, just twenty minutes prior to its being destroyed, so it would not fall into the hands of the Japanese.

It was a lecture that one seldom has the opportunity of hearing.

Bishop D. H. Moore went to Weiser this morning after lecturing in the Methodist church last evening. He was entertained while in the city, by Mr. and Mrs. Geo. L. Cleaver.
