

PACIFIC COAST NEEDS LABORERS

San Francisco, Jan 16—Though the labor situation in this city is rapidly assuming normal conditions there is still a great demand for ordinary laborers not alone here but all the coast and thru the entire state. Bricklayers and carpenters are badly required and there is a great dearth of cement and iron structural workers. Construction is now going on in sixty steel and frame buildings from five to sixteen stories in height, within six blocks of Union Square but the work is handicapped owing to the absence of a sufficient number of laborers. The demand for clerical and office help is constant and increasing, as is also that for household help.

GERMANY TO HAVE FAIR IN 1912

Berlin, Jan 16—The Chamber of Commerce at its annual meeting today issued a statement dealing with the proposed great fair to be held in this city in 1912. It is the intention of the numerous Chambers of Commerce and Trade Associations in the Empire that the exhibition shall surpass all the worlds Fairs not excepting the marvelous exposition for which Paris is famous or the great American fairs. As the Emperor has desired that the fair will be typical of German thoroughness it will be truly representative of the German Empire. In his report the President of the Chamber, concludes with the following words. "Berlin expects within the five years to have attained the proud eminence of being the continents first capital in point of population and commercial and political importance and will make most lavish arrangements for entertaining foreigners"
Government will be asked to vote twenty million marks to help the project.

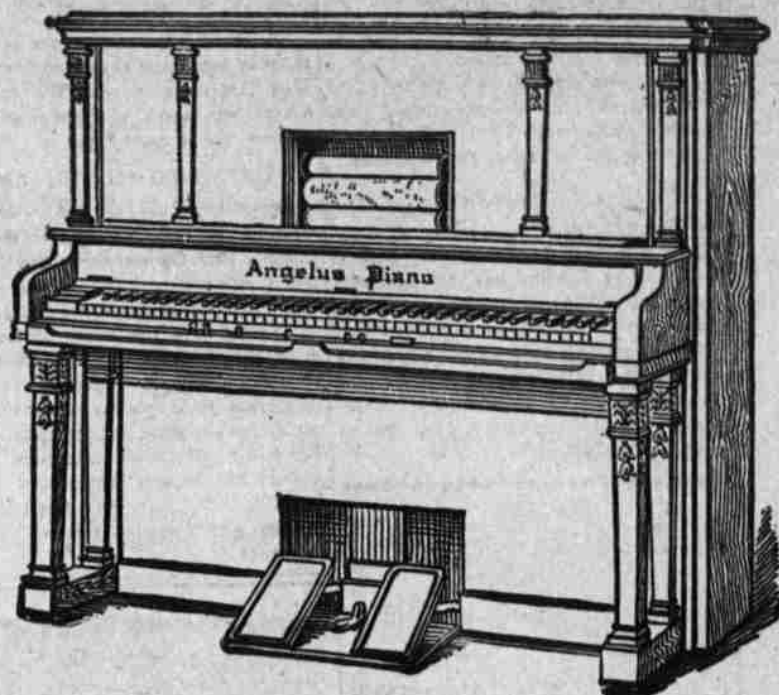
AREO CLUB TO FLY IN THE WEST
