## RUSSIAN MAKES OFF WITH VALUABLE JEWELRY

Jewelry, valued at more than one hundred and twenty-five dollars, is missing: So is Henry Scheffer, the Russian wrestler, who recently issued a challenge to wrestle for love, money, or honor. Without alleging that the former incident is the cause or result of the latter fact, it might be easily so constructed.

About three weeks ago Henry Scheffer came to La Grande and hearing of board and room being offered by Mrs. Rose Harris, went there and related a story that would touch the heart of any lady. He said: "I am without money now, but I have a contract to paint the new saw mill, have contracts to paint various signs and if you will advance my board until I get my first pay check, I will employ your son at a good salary to assist me and of course pay the board advanced. I have a phonograph at A. B. Heulat and a trunk at the Blue Mountain House."

Mrs. Harris consented to the request and since then Scheffer has been about the city but if he has actually labored at that time is not definitely known.

Within the last week he issued a challenge to wrestle and had just signed an agreement as previously stated in this paper.

Monday morning, Scheffer was in his rooms in the Harris home and about nine o'clock went down town. That was the last seen of him at or near his room.

Number six was several hours late that morning, and while waiting at the depot in company with several men, the conversation drifted to gold during which time he exhibited a splendid gold watch and pieces of gold coin.

About noon Mrs. Harris discovered that her watch, a present to her and valued much more highly as a memento than for

its intrinsic value, which is conservatively estimated at fifty dollars, was missing.

This led to a general inventory of her jewelry which resulted in the astonishing fact that still another gold watch, a beautiful thing, and the property of Ruth Harris, and a valuable old-fashioned bracelet were missing. \$125 could not purchase the three articles.

Mrs. Harris said nothing to the police but waited for the return of her son who was out of the city nor did she in any way connect the loss of jewelry with the absence of the Russian, whom she momentarily expected to return to his room.

Professor Christol was the first to make public the theft, for on learning of the disappearance, he quickly put two and two together and on the return of Mr. Harris, caused a warrant to be made for the Russian's arrest.
