STATE LIBRARY AT PENDLETON

Petitions for a state library at Pendleton have been placed in the hands of five eastern Oregon judicial districts and La Grande attorneys generally have signed it. The need of a state library at Pendleton is created by the fact that the supreme court holds two sessions in that city annually where eastern Oregon cases exclusively are being heard. There is no public library in Pendleton and when attorneys go there to argue cases they must borrow law books from Pendleton attorneys.

It is recited in the petition that there are a number of duplicate books in the library at Salem and these could be brought to Pendleton to form the nucleus of the state library. The amount to be appropriated by the legislature is left blank and is to be filled in at the discretion of the legislators.
