DEFENDS SMOOT

(Scripps News Association)

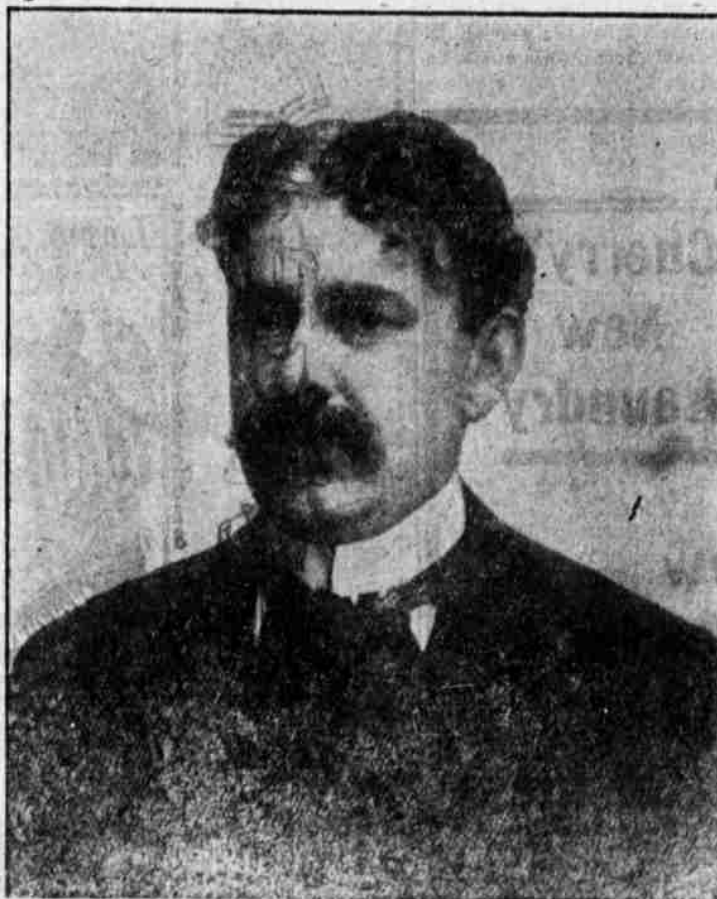
Washington Jan 22—Senator George
Sutherland, of Utah, made his maiden
effort in the senate today in defense of
Senator Reed Smoot. He said the issue
to him seemed simple. "If Smoot was a
lawbreaker, either as principal or acces-
sory, if he recognizes higher power than
his allegiance to his country or if condi-
tions are such as to bring reproach upon
the senate, he ought not to retain his
seat. If he was not guilty of any of these
charges, he should not be deprived of his

seat in obedience to popular clamor. The
charges of polygamy are all refuted.

Since a boy Senator Smoot was op-
posed to the practice and had done much
to put an end to the system. As an ob-
server of the Mormon people, I say to-
day that they are as patriotic as any in
the country. Smoot during his four
years service in the senate has won the
respect and admiration of his colleagues
and has proven by his devotion to duty
and patriotic regard for his obligations as
any citizen of this republic."
