## HERE IS SOMETHING OUT OF THE ORDINARY

### Two Baker County Men Indicted For Padding Their Bills On County Road Work

Facing graft charges that may result in imprisonment in the penitentiary, L. E. Tureman, a prominent Burnt River rancher, and his son George Tureman, stood in the circuit court this afternoon while District Attorney Lomax read the indictment returned by the grand jury of Baker county charging them with obtaining money under false pretenses—says the Baker City Herald.

The indictment recites that Tureman padded their bills for road work for Baker county, and were guilty of graft, in the claims they had been in the habit of submitting to the county court.

L. E. Tureman is one of the big ranchers near Hereford, a man with much stock, and a great broad farm. He is one of the prominent men of the neighborhood, and was recommended and appointed as a road worker in his district.

For more than a year, Clerk Combs believes it is two years, Tureman has been doing road work, employing his son to assist him, and turning in bills to the county court of Baker county.

When the present county court came into power it announced that the road graft was at an end. If the charges of the grand jury are true the Turemans' failed to heed that warning.

Repeated prunings of bills taught many of the road supervisors under the old regime that the county court did not pro-

pose to pay for value not received. The summary removal of others from office also conveyed the same lesson.

But in spite of these warnings, the Turemans, if the charge be true, put in bills at the October term of court which were about \$20 and \$25 too great, respectively. The bills were allowed.

The county court, however, was not altogether satisfied, and began an investigation of the bills. It was determined that if any graft existed it should cease. The indictments are the result of the investigation started by Judge Messick, and his fellows in the county court for the purpose of stopping a leak in the county funds.

The matter was taken up by the grand jury. Prominent men from the neighborhood were examined by that body, and it was determined by the members that the bill of L. E. Tureman should have been for but \$64 and the bill of George Tureman for but \$59.50 instead of \$84 each. Then the indictments were returned.

The witnesses examined by the grand jury, according to the indictments, were John M. Huffines, J. B. King, and Byron Ruddell.

The Turemans were arraigned this afternoon at 1:50 and through their attorney Judge White, entered pleas of not guilty. They were admitted to bail on bonds of \$500 each.

## NEVADA BUILDING BLOWS UP

## BIG SENSATION IN WILL CASE

Pendleton, Jan. 26.—Forgery and uttering a forged instrument are the two charges upon which Mrs. Maybelle Young Warner was indicted by the grand jury yesterday afternoon. She was arraigned and given until 1:30 this afternoon to plead. She was represented by Attorney J. P. Winters, who received the \$1,000 cash bail which she was required to put up for her appearance in the court today.

It is alleged that Mrs. Warner forged two wills to the estate of the late J. W. Young of Weston. This estate is valued at \$40,000 and according to the last will which appeared, the principal beneficiary is Mrs. Warner, the niece and alleged daughter of Mr. Young.

This is by far the most important indictment that has been returned at this session and this trial will be one of the most interesting and hardest fought cases to come before the circuit court of this county, since the famous Davis trial of 1911.

## ROADS MUST STAND TRIAL

The case will now go to trial on the original indictments at the April term of the federal court.
