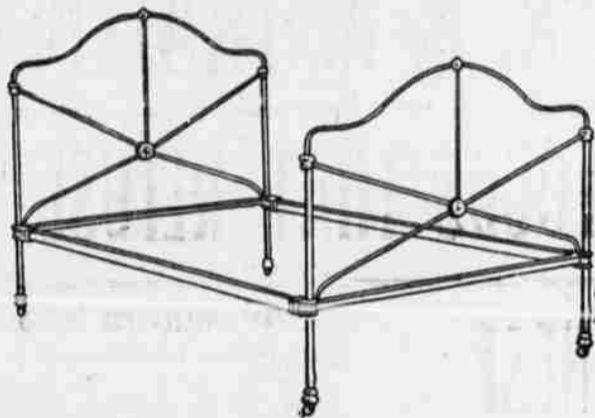

If the present railroad investigations continue to enlighten the people during the next twelve months as they have the past year. Mr Bryan will have more following along his policy of government ownership than he had when he first outlined his policy upon returning home, after spending several months in the countries that operated their own roads. As a rule Mr. Bryan's policies have been weakened by subsequent events, but it seems that this time the conditions are liable to continue in his favor.

Organized labor in New Jersey asks in lieu of the contract system in state prisons, there be enacted a law compelling the employment of convicts by the State direct, with their wages fixed at a fair valuation, the wages sent to their families. The labor men say that with such a law they would no longer oppose prison-made goods.

It was brot out at the Interstate Commerce Commission hearing at Salem a few days ago that the several lines which make up the Harriman system charge each other for the freight transported over the respective lines one half cent per ton per mile. This is brot home to the proprietors of the Observer in a rather forceable manner. Within a few days this office will receive a car load of paper from Portland, the weight of which will be 30,000 pounds, the freight on which will amount to \$192, whereas under the rates the several roads charge each other the rate on this same car would be \$22-87. A few jolts like this and it will not take much to make us firm believers, in the righteousness of the government ownership of these common carriers.

The tide of immigration will set toward Oregon this year more than ever. Union county needs about twenty thousand more progressive people. We have the resources whereby they all can make a good living. The only trouble is so few of the Eastern homeseekers know anything about Union county. However of the thousands that will come to this state during the spring months, some of them will find their way to this county.

The quarterly bulletin of the New York State Department of Labor says: "As the prices of the necessaries and comforts bought by the workingmen have increased in the neighborhood of 30 per cent in the period 1897-1906 wage earners even in the organized trades, cannot be said to be enjoying an undue share of prosperity, while workers employed on salary are on the whole in a less fortunate position than they were before prices began to rise.

Time is sliding along. As yet nothing has been done with a view of reorganizing our county fair. There is no use attempting any more farces similar to the last two. It would be much better to abandon the idea altogether.

The Observer is in possession of a poem on the "Beautiful Buttercup" which we expected to use in this issue but the heavy frost this morning was sufficient to cause its non-appearance for several days.

While the Oregon legislation is divided on the proposed railroad commission as to the appointment, the Washington legislature is divided upon the question of changing their law which appoints, whereby their commission can be, elected by the people.

The bill before the legislature requiring two thirds or three fourths of a jury to return verdicts in civil cases should become a law the present system requiring a unanimous opinion of twelve men is behind the times and justice is often thwarted by either their ignorance or design of of some one juror.
