

LA GRANDE NATIONAL IN NEW BUILDING

The La Grande National bank is today transacting its business in the commodious well lighted, roomy and modern bank structure which has been erected for banking and office. At nine o'clock this morning business was opened by A. C. Roberts, an employee for the building contractor, where he made the first deposit in the new bank.

To the right of the entrance are three

supplied with both telephones. At this point the corridor has narrowed down to an ally that leads into a general reception and waiting room. Beyond this reception room is another private room, large enough and so arranged, that it will be suitable for directors' meetings.

compartments. The first being a general waiting room, while adjoining that is Cashier F. L. Meyers' private consultation room. The next department is the cashier's office and is separated from the corridor by a half partition. From the private office, the various departments of the bank zig zag diagonally across the floor space. Each department is enclosed by a steel fencing, and provided with a sliding gate at the rear so that the department head is entirely secluded and no one can enter his department.

At the first window, is W. L. Brenholt, in the capacity of paying teller. Adjoin-

ing his department is the receiving letter's window, C. S. Williams acts in this capacity. Those having business with the collection department must step to the third window where Herman Clark has his books.

The fourth and last window is the bookkeeper's, Earl Zundell assisted by Hugh McCall have their duties to perform behind this window.

The safety deposit department of the National bank, is thoroughly provided for. A glass door marks the entrance to the vault where are kept safety deposit boxes. A public telephone booth is today being

The vault in which the funds are kept is between the wall facing Elm street, and the safety deposit vault. To lessen the arduous work of carrying the monster ledgers, journals and books of a similar nature, an omnibus is employed. This consists of a series of shelves arranged one above the other in a frame. The frame itself is portable thus permitting a load of books being hauled from the safety deposit vault in the morning, distributed to each department, picked up at the closing hour, and returned to the vault, by the mere turn of a hand.

OREGON OSTEOPATHS ASK FOR SQUARE DEAL

We beg to call your attention to provisions of Senate Bill 69 and House Bill 256 as follows: It calls for—

First: An examining board to be appointed by the Governor, said board being of no expense to the state.

Second: Preliminary education equal to high school diploma or college entrance examination, before examination for Osteopathy.

Third: Three years of nine months each, college work and examination before Board in Anatomy, physiology, histology, pathology, chemistry, toxicology, diagnosis, hygiene, obstetrics, gynecology, minor surgery, principles and practice of Osteopathy.

Fourth: Licensing of Osteopaths already in the state.

Fifth: All Osteopaths are prohibited from giving drugs or practicing surgery.

Sixth: As amended Section 10 provides that this act shall not be so construed as to interfere with or prevent the practice of or use of massage, Swedish movement, physical culture, or other natural methods requiring the use of the hand or hands, provided that each person or persons do not violate the provisions of Section 7 of this act or any part or parts of said Section.

We beg to call attention that this act is strictly to regulate the practice of Osteopathy and in no way interferes with any other method or system of treatment.
