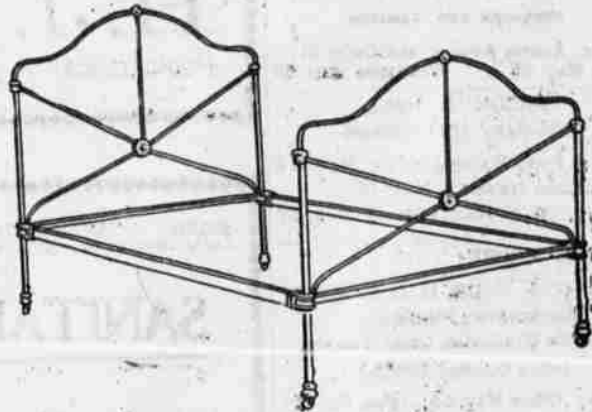

"ONLY RAILROAD REMEDY"

For 50 years Germany wrestled with railroad rate wars, discriminations, rebates throttled industries thru railroad favoritism, and all the complicated and vexing multitude of railroad questions which are now burdening the public mind in the United States.

In vain the empire tried to regulate the private roads. The Prussian parliament passed law after law, made rule after and punished without stint the guilty conspirators who, thru selfishness were retarding the growth of the country by discriminating rates.

Private ownership resulted in monopoly. Practically all of the great lines of Germany were controlled by one great system. It was so well organized that it was impossible for the government to reach it by legislation, courts or agreements.

The railroads octopus reached the height of avarice in Germany about 1875. It seemed that nothing could stay its progress.

But there arose in Germany at that time, the monumental intellect of Bismark to offer a means of salvation for the empire. This great man, as potent and forceful in peace as in war, called the Prussian cabinet together and for weeks labored in preparing a remedy for railroad abuses in Germany.

When the parliament met in 1879 Bismark presented what is said to be the greatest collection of railroad literature ever collected together in the history of the world.

The result of the message from Bismark was the nationalization of German railroads and at once the country was relieved of its abuses and enjoyed universal prosperity.

That is the only satisfactory remedy. The people of the United States will come to it in time.—Pendleton E. O.

The first result of the operation of the national pure food law has been an increase in the price of canned meats. For an instance, canned chicken, which costs 95 cents per dozen quarter pound cans before the law went into effect, now costs \$1.75 for the same amount of chicken. Corned beef has gone up from \$1.25 for a dozen half-pound cans to \$1.90 a dozen. And other canned meats have gone up in proportion. Yet there has been no increase in the cost of live chickens or beef to the packers. We may have to get along with little less chicken and a little less corned beef at least of the canned variety, but when we so eat it it will be pleasant to know that we are eating the real stuff, not meal and gristle mixed and other substances entirely foreign to the description on the ornate label.—Democrat.
