NOTES FROM THE LABOR WORLD

The International Association of Machinists has \$100,000 in its treasury.

The labor unionists of Tennessee favor legislation which will require the labeling of all prison-made goods.

After discussing the subject at considerable length the Utah State Federation of Labor decided against entering the field of politics as an organization.

The Woman's Trade Union League of Great Britain is now on a solid foundation and is steadily growing in numbers and influence. The increase in membership last year was more than 11,000.

Chicago retail clerks, in a big meeting recently, voted to demand a nine-hour day, with double pay for over-time. Clerks

in the smaller stores say they are working now from seventy to seventy-five hours weekly.

The 65,000 members of the Bricklayers and Masons' International Union who for the third time are taking a referendum vote thruout the country on the question of joining the American Federation of Labor are likely this time to vote in the affirmative. The concrete question is becoming more and more a menace to the trade, and the masons want the aid of the international unions if there is to be a fight on the question.

The hours of labor in Belgium are very long. The laborers begin work at 6 a m and ceases work at 7 p.m., with the usual breaks for meals. He is paid on an average of 7 to 9 cents an hour for 10 hours and 26 per cent more for two additional hours, making his daily wages 84 cents to \$1.08 for 12 hours. Numerous factories have been established there by British firms owing to the very low rate at which labor can be secured.

THINK OF THIS

A nation unequalled in diplomacy, by giving us a San Francisco school problem may have had in mind the solution of its own nearer home. The Chinese elephant is not responding as readily to the little Japanese "mahout" as Westerners suppose. China has the same object in employing Japanese teachers as Japan had in employing European teachers forty years ago: to arm herself mentally and physically for self defense against outside meddling. Altho she lacks Japan's solidarity for applying the knowledge gained, her statesmen are quick observers, as alert in setting two strong neighbors one against the other as Abdul Hamid of distressing memory. To them Tokyo's ambitions are not more philanthropic than Bullin's. When the outside world sees a generous Japan returning the Newchwag customs to the Chinese before the expiration of the eighteen month's provision of the Portsmouth Treaty in April, the Dowager Empress, who was not born yesterday, might drop an eyelid over the fact that Newchwag is a closed port thru the winter months. The Japanese warm-

ing across the straits are making Korea the advance ground for migration across the borders, where Japanese traders, peasants and adventures, taking the law into their hands, are traveling and settling wherever they please. Hitherto an open port in China has meant simply that a foreigner might reside in one section of the town itself. In the opening of the new ports of Manchuria the Japanese demand the right of free residence and travel, which is a blow at the heart of China's policy.—Colliers Weekly.
