DISASTER AT STARBUCK

Walla Walla, Feb. 7, 3:30 p. m.—There has been a disastrous flood at Starbuck, but despite its proximity to this place not a definite word has yet reached beyond the significant fact that all telegraph and telephone wires are down and that the O. R. & N. bridge across the Tucannon has been completely torn out and the railroad bridge at Grange City, a hamlet near Starbuck, has been practically ruined.

All stories purporting to be details of the flood are pretenses, as the newspapers of this place are as yet unable to get anything in the nature of a narration of facts about the flood. The presumption is, however, that the town has met with a disaster, and perhaps the major part has been swept away.

COMPARISON OSTEOPATHIC - VS. - MEDICAL AT THE SCATEN RENK

In 1882 the College of Physicians and Surgeons in New York City required attendance upon two courses of lectures of seven months in length in the calendar years.

In 1881 Bellevue Medical College required two courses of six months each. In 1887 the Albany (N. Y.) Medical College was three years of five months each and was the same in 1890. In 1896 they advertised a course of three years of a fraction of over six months.

American School of Osteopathy established 1892 required in 1896 a course of 20 months of schooling. In 1904 this was extended to three years of nine months each or 27 months of schooling.

To those who are inclined to belittle the Osteopathic course of study, the above data is food for thought. Oregon Legislature can do no greater work at this session than to legalize this progressive school of practice by granting them an independent board of examiners.
