Section 4.—That said ballots shall be counted and the returns thereof made and canvassed and the result certified in the same manner as ballots for the election of City officers are counted and returns canvassed and certified.

Section 5.—That when the returns shall be canvassed and certified by the Recorder if it is found that a majority of the votes cast on said question are in favor of authorizing the Council to issue and negotiate said additional bonds the certificate of the Recorder to that effect shall be entered at length upon the journal of the Council and the original hereof be filed in the Recorder's office.

Section 6.—That the Recorder shall give notice of said election by publication thereof for ten days in the La Grande Evening Observer and shall state therein the said question to be voted on.

Section 7.—This ordinance shall be published in one issue of the La Grande Evening Observer and shall be in full force and effect from and after the 11th day of February, 1907.

Passed by the Council on the 8th day of February 1907, by six members voting therefor and no members voting against the same.
