 A certificate entitles the holder to admission and medical and surgical treatment in a ward in the Hospital—if desired medicine and treatment can be given at home—within the period of time the certificate is issued for, in consequence of wounds, injuries or sickness hereafter received or contracted, wholly disabling him from performing the duties of his occupation subject to the following conditions:
 1—That certificate holder agrees with the rules and regulations of the Hospital.
 2—The benefits secured by the certificate are limited to the period of time the certificate is issued for.
 3—No benefits will be allowed for either of the following ailments to wit: Insanity, venereal diseases and Small-pox.
 4—The certificate is not transferable and any one using it other than for himself will be prosecuted by law.

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 RESUME WORK

Chief Engineer Arthur B. Browne of the Central Railway, returned from New York Monday last, says that ample capital has been secured to insure the immediate completion of the belt railroad around the valley according to the original plans, says the Union Republican.
 Under the arrangements made, the work of construction will be carried on by the Central Railway Company, and there will be no separate construction company interested in the work as before.
 Mr. Browne affirms that the company is on an absolutely sound and conservative business basis, and proposes to make good every pledge to the people of this valley.
 The directors in control of the company are the men behind the project financially, and they propose to build the road just as fast as the work can be done, and in ample time to handle the 1907 crops.
 The work of laying ties and steel on the grade as far as completed, will begin soon, and further grading will be done as soon as the weather will permit.
 The fact that the company announces an active campaign during 1907 ought to be exceedingly gratifying to the people of this valley, who, we feel certain, will do all in their power in aid of the enterprise.
