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SPOKANE DETECTIVE AFTER KID BARKER

Harry Draper, the Spokane detective, and his notorious hounds, passed thru La Grande yesterday or the night previous according to the following as related by the Baker City Herald of Tuesday.
Somewhere in this district of Eastern Oregon, Harry Draper, the Spokane sleuth with his three blood hounds, which have figured so prominently in the manhunts of the northwest, are hot upon the trail of Kid Barker, the desperado who has been eluding the officers of the law for the past four or five weeks. Where the hounds and their quarry are playing at hide and seek is a question as yet unanswered.
Word was received in Spokane Sunday that Kid Barker was in the Baker district. Harry Draper immediately made his preparations and departed for this city. The Spokane newspaper men learned of his departure some hours afterward and telephoned to Walla Walla. There the newspaper men arrived at the depot just in time to see the train bearing Draper leave the station. They immediately telegraphed to Pendleton but the message was delayed and Draper had been gone an hour having purchased a ticket for Baker City.
Investigation shows that Draper probably arrived here between three and four o'clock yesterday morning and took the Sumpter train for the upper camps the same day. People have been located who say they saw a man with three hounds enter that train, although the local agent reports that he did not notice Draper.
Another theory is that Draper left the train at Haines and started across the country towards Medical Springs on his way to the Seven Devils copper country, while still another is that he stopped at La Grande, went to Union and is working towards Lewiston, Idaho.

THE GOLD AND SILVER CROP

(Scripps News Association)
Washington, Feb. 15.—Statistics showing gold and silver production in the United States during 1906 have some interesting features. Colorado still leads in respect of the production of gold, but shows a decrease of about \$3,000,000 from 1905. California remains in second place. Alaska's output is third largest. Nevada, thanks to the activity in the new mines at Goldfield and Tonopah, has nearly doubled its output, showing \$9,816,800 against \$5,559,100 in 1905. Wyoming has the smallest output. The output credited to "other states" shows a surprising increase from only \$17,100 in 1905 to \$429,100. Colorado likewise leads the silver states, and has nearly held its own, while Montana, which led in 1905, shows a decrease of nearly two millions. Next in order to these two are Utah, Idaho, Nevada and Arizona. Georgia has the smallest output, an even \$1000 among the states an territories individually mentioned. To other states \$360,000 is credited. The total output of silver is \$66,488,500, which is \$81,900 greater than in 1905.

GOVERNMENT HAY FOR THE STATE OF MONTANA

Virginia City, Mont., Feb. 15.—Owing to the threatened starvation of upwards of 20,000 head of cattle in the vicinity of Assiniboine by reason of the severe weather, and need of hay, straw and grain, the Secretary of War has announced that these commodities, in limited quantities, will be sold during the next three months, at actual cost to the United States. The stock to be disposed of will be that stored for the use of the garrison at Fort Assiniboine. There is a great scarcity of hay and grain in the state, and this, coupled with the fact that the weather is the severest known for many years, renders the outlook to ranchmen anything but bright.

MORMON TABERNACLE IS NEARING COMPLETION

It will only be a few months until the big Mormon Tabernacle is completed. A few days more and the steam heating plant will be installed.
Messrs L. Garrick & Son have the contract for the painting and tinting which when it is considered the high class of work that being executed it is no small task within itself.
