The Management of the Union Hospital wishes to announce that Hospital Certificates are issued at the rate of \$1.00 for one month, \$2.75 for three months, \$5.50 for six months and \$10.00 for one year.

A certificate entitles the holder to admission and medical and surgical treatment in a ward in the Hospital—if desired medicine and treatment can be given at home—within the period of time the certificate is issued for, in consequence of wounds, injuries or sickness hereafter received or contracted, wholly disabling him from performing the duties of his occupation subject to the following conditions:

1—That certificate holder agrees with the rules and regulations of the Hospital.

2—The benefits secured by the certificate are limited to the period of time the certificate is issued for.

3—No benefits will be allowed for either of the following ailments to wit: Insanity, venereal diseases and Small-pox.

4—The certificate is not transferable and any one using it other than for himself will be prosecuted by law.

Intoxication and drunkenness will not be allowed in or around the hospital, and certificate holders breaking this rule will be expelled and certificate cancelled without recourse.

CALL FOR BIDS

Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received by the County Court of Union county, Oregon, up to twelve o'clock noon on the 7th day of March, 1907, for the construction of a 160 foot span steel bridge over the Grande Ronde River near Perry, Oregon. Said bridge to be of a good quality of steel and to be built upon concrete piers. Said piers are to be built about 21 feet in height; about 29 feet in width at the bottom; about 22 feet in width at the top and shall be built with a batter on the front and each side, of one foot in six. Said bids to be presented as follows: A separate bid for the construction of the bridge; a separate bid for the construction of the piers or a separate bid for the construction of the bridge and piers. Each bid shall be presented for the building of the piers for so much per cubic yard.
