ORIGIN OF ST. VALENTINE DAY; ITS PECULIARITIES

The origin of St Valentine's day, which will be celebrated today will always be an interesting subject to those who observe the customs of the day. The House-keeper gives the following brief but comprehensive sketch of the day:
A fact in natural history, to-wit: that birds in Southern Europe pair about the middle of February, is said to have inspired a custom of the ancient Romans, to which the origin of the modern valentine can undoubtedly be traced. At the feast of the Lupercalia, held in honor of the great god Pan, the names of the virgin daughters of Rome were put in a box, and drawn therefrom by the young men. Each youth was bound to offer a gift to the maiden who fell in his lot, and to make her his partner during the time of the feast.
How this secular custom became allied to the name of a saint is altogether a different matter. St. Valentine was a bishop of Rome during the third century. He appears to have been a man of very genial nature, and most eloquent of speech wherefore he was very successful in convert-

JOHN SNODGRASS DIED SUDDENLY TUESDAY MORNING

Circumstances of Death not known, but Body will be Brought to La Grande for Interment--Leaves wife and Child

A telegram from Okanagon Falls, B. C., to Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Snodgrass last Tuesday, informed the parents that their son John D. Snodgrass died suddenly last Tuesday. In complying with the request of the wire, which asked that instructions be wired back relative to funeral arrangements, W. J. Snodgrass has gone to Seattle where he will take a boat for the nearest seaport to the inland town from whence came the news of death.
The telegram notifying La Grande relatives of John's death, was preceded the day before by one from the deceased's wife saying briefly, "John very ill." Tuesday, the following day, came the announcement of his death. No particulars were attached as to the circumstances. It is not known whether he was at Okanagon Falls or further in the interior when death came. There are no undertakers in the place and the body will be packed in ice until it reaches a town, where the remains can be properly treated.
Tuesday evening W. J. Snodgrass left for the north to meet the body. Since his departure a wire has been received from Mrs. Snodgrass saying that the body would be staged to Stimmerland. This is a new town and no one in this city knows where it is located. Mr. Snodgrass will receive a wire from La Grande when he arrives at Vernon, telling him of the town where his son now lies. Due to the uncertainty of where the body actually is and the distance it is from rapid transit, the body will not like-
