To the People:

I had thought, for a while, that I would not be a candidate for the office of mayor for another term but on account of recent developments and of matters that have come to my knowledge I am put into a position wherein I am compelled to come to the front as a matter of principle and incidentally to give the "boys some fun."

From a monetary standpoint there is no inducement whatever to accept the office—in fact the duties of the office entail a great loss in the shape of time spent in the service of the city and money spent for expenses. There is no salary nor emoluments and prerequisites incident to the office, and no remuneration, in a coarser form, such as "graft" or "rakeoff" even though a person desired to be a grafter. I think every man should be paid for services rendered.

The lineup as presented between Captain Paul and Dr. Richardson did not appear to you to join an issue of sufficient importance to make a contest that would arouse your enthusiasm so you would get out and work for your candidate or for the principles he might represent. In a contest of this kind the alignment should be such, and the issue defined in such a way that the point of issue or the place where the embattled ideas meet becomes so hot that no man can stand there, but every man must array himself for or against the opposing forces.

The candidates themselves cut no figure from a personal standpoint. It is fortunate in one sense, that both of my opponents are among the closest and most intimate friends I have in the world so there can be no personal feeling of bitterness between us. The only question you have to decide is what we represent and which policy will best subserve your interests and welfare.

The way for you to decide this question is to inquire into the record, size up the policy and principles of the candidates and then select the man you think will serve you the best and whose policy will produce the most desirable results.

A year ago your humble servant issued a manifesto which, in a measure, was a platform and declaration of principles. You accepted it as such, however, and returned for me a handsome majority over the other candidates. This was followed by messages and recommendations to the council touching the condition of the affairs of the city and as to matters that would require the attention of the council. You have been kept posted from then till now as to every stage of the proceedings in carrying out the policy outlined, the details of which are too enormous for me to recapitulate. I told you on the start I believed in publicity for public affairs, and you must agree with me on one point, which is, I have kept my promise in this though I have failed in everything else. All these matters for your information have been published without charge and nothing has been charged to the city except notices, ordinances and special contracts.

I will soon pass away but the work that I do will leave its impression on this city. Judge all the candidates in the same way. It is up to you. If I have made good endorse me, if not turn me down tenderly, but turn me down. I will serve you again if you say so, and in the meantime will show you a good time.

The Management of the Union Hospital wishes to announce that Hospital Certificates are issued at the rate of \$1.00 for one month, \$2.75 for three months, \$5.50 for six months and \$10.00 for one year.

A certificate entitles the holder to admission and medical and surgical treatment in a ward in the Hospital—if desired medicine and treatment can be given at home—within the period of time the certificate is issued for, in consequence of wounds, injuries or sickness hereafter received or contracted wholly disabling him from performing the duties of his occupation subject to the following conditions:

- 1—That certificate holder agrees with the rules and regulations of the Hospital.
 - 2—The benefits secured by the certificate are limited to the period of time the certificate is issued for.
 - 3—No benefits will be allowed for either of the following ailments to wit: Insanity, venereal diseases and Small-pox.
 - 4—The certificate is not transferable and any one using it other than for himself will be prosecuted by law.
- Intoxication and drunkenness will not be allowed in or around the hospital, and certificate holders breaking this rule will be expelled and certificate cancelled without recourse.
