CHANGING MEXICAN MINING LAW
(Scripps News Association)
Mexico City, Feb. 16.—An important amendment to the present mining law is being discussed in the federal congress today. It is proposed to place all foreigners who will invest a prescribed sum in the development and improvement of claims, exactly on the same footing as Mexican citizens. It is also intended to reduce the cost of denunciations. The new law, if passed, will effect a very large number of United States prospectors who are working claims in this republic.
