DOCTOR MOORE REVIEWS CAREER OF OSTEOPATHY BILL

It is only right the friends and patients of Osteopathy should know why they are denied the benefits of a good Osteopathic law at the hands of the legislature now in session at Salem. The original bill presented by the osteopaths is the same measure passed in at least eighteen or twenty states. We asked for an Independent Board of Osteopathic Examiners to examine Osteopaths and was to be at no expense to the state at all. That is a just demand, but it has been denied as items from the Oregonian in this issue will show. And why? Simply because three M. D.'s in the senate and one M. D. in the house were powerful enough to throttle the measure.

It was not that they were carrying out the will of the people whose servants they are in the legislature. Hundreds of letters and telegrams asking for the original osteopathic bill to be passed carried no weight with them. They knew what the dear people needed and the people must be protected from the Osteopaths. However the friends of Osteopathy in the Legislature were so persistent for Osteopathy to get a square deal, that the medical committee being forced to save themselves from everlasting ignominy, killed the original measure and offered a substitute bill allowing one Osteopathic appointment on their M. D. Board. The attorney general pronounced the substitute, unconstitutional and thus we see another ruse by this wily M. D. Committee. It is to be deplored that the honest public has to give over the keys to that kind of servants.

The substitute was referred to Revision of Laws Committee and it is to be hoped was properly amended to make it a good law. Think before you vote for an M. D. senator next time.

F. E. MOORE'S BITTER PILL FOR OSTEOPATHS
Salem Or., Feb. 15.—The osteopaths got what they didn't want at the hands of the Senate tonight when that body passed a substitute bill in the place of the one introduced by Senator Nottingham at the osteopaths, Nottingham struggled frantically to stem the tide running against him but it was too much for him and the bill passed with only three dissenting votes.

The bill introduced by Nottingham provided for a separate board board of examiners for osteopaths. The bill went to the committee on medicine and pharmacy and several days ago that committee reported a substitute providing for one osteopath on the State Board of Medical Examiners and requiring osteopaths to take examinations before that board tho they are not required to pass on materia medica.

Nottingham said he would rather no bill be passed than this which would place the osteopaths at the mercy of the physicians of the older schools. He moved that the bill be referred back to the committee on revision of laws, which was done and today that committee reported the substitute bill favorably, much to Nottingham's chagrin.

Tonight he tried to have the bill laid over until next week, when it would be too late for it get thru the Legislature but the Senate voted down his motion and passed the bill.

OSTEOPATHS LOOSERS AGAIN

Salem, Or., Feb. 15.—(Special)—Wilson's bill to regulate the practice of osteopathy and create a board of examiners therefore has been deferred in the House. It came up for third reading and final passage this morning, but after McCallion, who is a physician, had attacked the measure, the bill was referred to the committees on medicine and pharmacy and health and public morals to be further considered. This action was taken after McCallion failed in a motion to have the further consideration of the bill indefinitely postponed.

McCallion vigorously assailed the bill on technical grounds, basing his opposition on the fact that the bill proposed to give the right to use anesthetics notwithstanding the fact osteopaths deny the theory of medicine. He further charged that the board proposed to require of applicants for examination as osteopaths that they pass practically the same examination that is required of regular medical practitioners. He made an earnest appeal for an unfavorable disposition of the bill by the House.

Campbell ventured the information that the Senate had passed a bill similar to that under consideration in the House and for that reason he moved that the Wilson bill be laid on the table until the Senate measure could be reached. Wilson objected, saying that the bill as passed in the Senate was not the one desired by the osteopaths, who insisted that the measure as introduced by himself be enacted or none at all.

Speaker Davey made a strong speech for the Wilson bill and its favorable consideration. He said there was nothing in the bill that was unreasonable or against the theories of the medical profession as applied to the protection of health. He construed the bill to provide only that the Osteopaths be given an opportunity to protect themselves against unworthy applicants to practice the profession. But the motion to again refer the bill prevailed.—Oregonian.

BIG ATHLETIC EXHIBITION AT OPERA HOUSE TONIGHT

Jack Darnell, who will figure in the athletic contest at the opera house this evening, is resting, having reached a satisfactory physical condition.
