

Jerome Takes Witness

Continued From Page 1

Evelyn did not hold so well under fire of the questions today as she did formerly. Her voice was not so strong She related the story of the pie dinner at Stregis where herself, Thaw and a third man were present. The matter caused a small scandall at the time, but was surpressed from the newspapers. In reply to a question if Harry Thaw ever spoke of the dinner party in connection with White, who it is supposed the third man was, Evelyn replied:

"Harry referred to the subject frequently. He invariably said to me that the only place for White, was the penitentiary. He informed me that he knew of girls of good families who had suffered at the hands of White. The worst of all was when he tired of them, he cast them off. They would then drift lower and lower until they were women of the street When he talked to me of White, he always cried, so I tried to keep his mind off the subject."

Attorney Delmas then read a paper prepared by Thaw and shown to Evelyn in March 1906, which he had planned to send to the Anthony Comstock society, which has for its purpose, the suppression of the crime.

The paper as read set forth illicit and obscene matter that had been found in White's social studio. It referred also to a place that had been removed to No. 22 West 4th Street, which was kept for the purpose of debauching young American girls by rich criminals.

Then came the story of the "Pie-girl" by which the defense expects to show some of the debased mental condition and cold bloodedness of White.

WHAT PIE-GIRL MEANT

Evelyn related the incident of the pie girl supper and what it meant. She said 'I was in a theatre one night, dressing, when White came to me and told in a proud manner of the 'best staunt he ever did.' He continued to tell me that this particular girl was a pretty young thing being only fifteen. White had a monster lam prepared to clean lay and pie made, and placed within the pie the sew carpets and girl and some live fowls.

At the right time the pie was brot out The cover was broken and out flew the fowls, flapping their wings. Then the girl stood up, dressed in a piece of guaze. White admitted to me that he nearly got into trouble over it but managed to suppress the newspapers. I old him that he had ruined the young girl. He only aughed at me.

The witness then whispered the names of other girls who had been ruined by White but Jerome was the only one who heard who they were.
