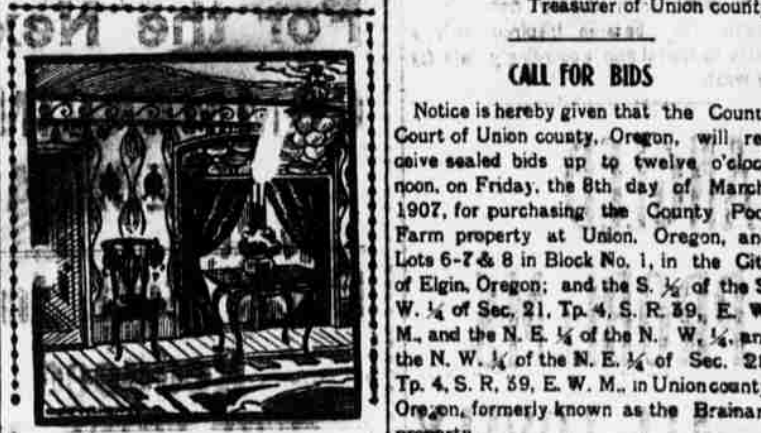
YOUTH COULD NOT WITHSTAND TEMPTATION

George Evans, a youth of seventeen years, was arrested last evening by Marshal Rayburn.
This is a rather peculiar case. The facts are that Mr. Samuel Ruckman of the Sandridge owed Mr. Geo. Evans who resides on the foothills north of this city \$58 and sent him a check for the amount thru the mail addressed to him at La Grande. Geo. Evans, the boy, who has lived in this city with his parents for several years, called at the post office for his mail and this letter was delivered to him. Upon opening the letter and discovering the check he later presented the same for payment at the La Grande National Bank. He was asked to identify himself, but instead presented the check to the Farmers & Traders National Bank, where the check was cashed as the officials knew the boy. As the check was originally drawn on the La Grande National, in the due course of business it was paid by the last named bank and charged to Mr. Ruckman's account.
About two weeks later Mr. Geo. Evans met Mr. Ruckman and asked him for the amount due him, to the astonishment of Mr. Ruckman, who informed him that he had mailed him the check, but in order that Mr. Evans could get his money gave him another check for the amount and phoned the La Grande National to withhold payment on the first check, when the bank informed him that the first check had already been presented and paid.
Investigation showed that the boy Geo. Evans had received the check and money instead of the rightful owner, but the boy could not be found. He, it is understood, left for Portland and returned day before yesterday, but instead of returning to his home, stayed with some friends near the railroad stock yards where he was found and arrested.
Here is a legal tangle. There is no question but what the boy appropriated money not intended for him and Mr. Ruckman is out with possibly no chance of recovery. It is not expected that the boy will be arranged until tomorrow and whether the charge will be forgery or obtaining money under false pretenses, remains to be seen. He endorsed the check "Geo. Evans" which was his name as well as the man's to whom the check was made payable. It is stated that under the circumstances the act of so endorsing it is as much forgery as if the boy's name had been another.

TO EXCLUDE THE CHINESE
