There was not a block of cement walk erected in the business portion of the city last year. There was a good start made the year before and should have been continued.

On the front page of the Scientific American appears a halftone of a photograph of the Crown Prince of Germany, transmitted electrically a distance of 1 100 miles. Prof. Korn has been working on this invention for a number of years and is meeting with success.

The efforts of District Attorney G. W. Phelps to rid Umatilla county of a disgusting type of men which cluster about the objectionable rooming houses and resorts, is appreciated by every self-respecting citizen. Umatilla county enjoys the distinction of having the only man of this stripe in the Oregon penitentiary. Others will follow him if the efforts of the district attorney and the city officials bear fruitage.—Pendleton E. O.

It will soon be the first of March and apparently there has been nothing done with reference to the reorganization of the county fair. "Properly handled Union county could maintain a fair" that would not only be creditable, but profitable. For a number of years the state fair simply existed but a few years ago new life was injected into it and for the past few years the state fair is one of the drawing features of the entire state, as it should be. Let us commence in time this year and have a rousing fair. One that will attract the attention of every section of the county.

The Tacoma authorities made a rade and captured 51 slot machines and confiscated them. The owners doubtless believe that the "liberties" of the common people are being restricted.

The La Grande Brick Yard did an unusually large business last year but there is every indication that it will have to increase its present capacity in order to take care of the local demand that will be made upon it this year. There is going to be something doing in the building line this year in La Grande.

Oregon has a railroad commission. It will doubtless require some months for the members to become familiar with their duties and powers. It is responsible position and means much to the business interests of the state. Eastern Oregon should have been represented on the board but the powers that be decreed otherwise.

The federal grand jury of New York has indicted the Great Northern railroad for rebating sugar shipments made by the sugar trust. The published rates were 52 cents per hundred pounds but the actual rate paid by the trust was 35 cents. A reduction equal to \$5.40 per ton. A saving as stated in the indictment of \$4,554. It is just such special privileges that the big shippers have been able to extort that has permitted them to ruin the small manufacturer and shipper.

Mr. Stearns of the Cove was in La Grande a few days ago to secure if possible a sentiment whereby La Grande would join with the Cove this year in a general Fourth of July celebration. Mr. Stearns is president of the Eastern Oregon G. A. R. Association, which meets this year in the Cove. The Pioneer Association of this county has also selected the Cove as its meeting place this year and Mr. Stearns will try and have that date selected whereby the Cove may have a four days celebration. It is expected that the Central railroad will have its line completed by July and all portions of the county can reach the Cove by rail.

The Cove is the first in the field and the other portions of the county have given little if any consideration to the national celebration and how they will fall into line with the suggestion remains to be seen.
