BIRTHDAY OF WASHINGTON GENERALLY OBSERVED

Rome, Feb. 22.—In all the large cities throughout Italy Washington's birthday was celebrated today, although the day has not yet been appointed a legal holiday notwithstanding the efforts of the Milan Peace Society towards this end. The Peace societies all over the country are taking steps to induce the government to set off Washington's birthday as a universal holiday.

New York, Feb. 22.—Washington's birthday was celebrated here today more generally than ever before. Flags were displayed on every public and on thousands of business houses and private residences. All clubs, schools, armories and similar buildings were thus decorated and all business in the city practically suspended.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 22.—In honor of the birthday of Washington all public and many other buildings in this city displayed the stars and stripes and all business is practically suspended. Thousands visited Mount Vernon and deposited flowers on the tomb of the Father of the Country.

Baltimore, Md., Feb. 22.—The patriotic societies of this city are celebrating Washington's birthday in a more elaborate manner than for many years. The principal celebration will be held by the Baltimore Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Feb. 22.—Never before in the history of this city has Washington's birthday been celebrated in so elaborate a manner.

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 22.—The faculty and students of the University of Pennsylvania today celebrated Washington's birthday in an elaborate manner. They assembled on the Campus at ten o'clock this morning and marched to the Academy of Music where patriotic exercises were held.

Boston, Mass., Feb. 22.—Washington's birthday was generally observed in this city today. This morning the members of the Massachusetts Society and the Sons of the American Revolution met the Hall of Flags where they were received by Governor Guild and his staff. After the reception they went to the American House where the annual meeting was held. This evening there will be a big banquet in honor of the day. The Spanish American War Veterans will also hold a reunion and banquet tonight.

"WASHINGTON AT PRAYER"

New York, Feb. 22.—One of the interesting features of the Washington birthday observance in the metropolis today was the unveiling of a tablet picturing "Washington at Prayer." The tablet was placed on the front of the historic old Sub-Treasury building at Nassau and Broad Streets and was unveiled at noon with interesting ceremonies participated in by the Washington Colonial Guards and other patriotic organizations.

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 22.—Ex-Governor Grover Cleveland was the guest of honor at the Union League Club's celebration in honor of Washington's birthday here today. He delivered an address eulogizing Washington. There will be a great banquet tonight in the auditorium under the auspices of the Union League Club.

Austin, Tex., Feb. 22.—Washington's birthday and Arbor day were fittingly celebrated here. All public buildings are closed and business suspended.

St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 22.—At the Washington celebration ceremony under the auspices of the Sons of the American Revolution a choir of 500 pupils from the Phalen Park school under the direction of Miss Elsie Shaw sang patriotic songs. Archbishop Ireland delivered a stirring address eulogistic of Washington.

SCHOOL CHILDREN AND OLD VETERANS HOLD PROGRAM

At the White building under the superintendency of Manuel Snider, the exercises were especially interesting. It was here that the G. A. R. and W. R. C. assembled.

The rooms were decorated in red white and blue. A cartoon drawn by one of the students, Milton Stoddard, brot forth meritorious comment. "Uncle Sam" holding a picture of George Washington with a line reading "I guess I will frame this."

The "George and Martha" exercise by twelve boys and girls, each bearing a flag and as they marched around singing, little Miss Lenora Hughey placed a crown upon the Father of our country.

The military drill of twelve soldiers dressed in colonial days commanded by "Geo. Washington" who lined his command up, delivered his address just prior to engagement of Long Island. This was especially interesting to the old Grand Army boys.

Commander Faulk and Comrade Kilpatrick each made short addresses that all present appreciated.

There was an excellent program which reflected credit on the participants and teachers.

HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM

In the high school, a debate, a few recitations, appropriate songs and an address constituted the program.

The debate was on the subject, "Resolved that George Washington did more for his country than did Abraham Lincoln." The affirmative was taken by Wane Pickler H. Zurbrick, L. Williamson.

On the negative of the question were Misses May Colt, Beth Wheatly and Ethel Redhead. All the debaters were new at the science but nevertheless made very interesting arguments. The judges awarded the decision to the affirmative.

Miss Marjory McCall recited, and Ed Carbine delivered an oration on George Washington. Attorney Charles Cochran delivered an address on George Washington that was extremely interesting and instructive.
