IMPORTING JAPANESE COAL

(Scripture News Association)
 Tacoma, Wash., Feb. 25.—A Japanese steamer is discharging a large cargo of coal here and other steamers are now on their way across the Pacific with supplies to relieve the great shortage on the west coast. The scarcity of coal has greatly effected the traffic and shipping in Puget Sound as the tugs cannot bring in vessels now lying outside, without coal. As Japan is not prepared to export any considerable quantity of coal to this country, the present importations will only afford temporary relief. Besides the car shortage he coal famine on the Pacific coast is also due to the inability of the American mines to produce supplies fast enough to meet the growing demand. Though the country's annual output has increased 130 per cent during the past ten years the demand is always far ahead of the supply. Arrangements are now being made for large shipments from Australia.

A NEW RECORD FOR STATE APPROPRIATIONS

Salem, Or., Feb. 23.—More expensive to the taxpayers than any Legislature Oregon has ever had is the one, which today ended its regular session. It appropriated about \$5,000,000, which added to the \$200,000 standing appropriation for the biennial period of 1907-8, brings the total up to \$5,500,000. This is nearly \$900,000 more than the high record total for 1903-4, of \$2,623,717.

The question naturally arises: For what are the increased appropriations made? The answer is, the general increase in the cost of running the state institutions and the need of making improvements. Among the new items is \$400,000 for roads provided for in the bill of Senator Johnson and now in the hands of the Governor, perhaps to be voted. Another is \$300,000 for free locks at Oregon City. Still another \$100,000 for National Guard armories. Again another \$100,000 for the Sratte Exposition and one more large appropriation of \$110,000 is for a home for the feeble-minded.

Other new expenditures are \$35,000 for a railroad commission, \$16,000 for sheep inspector, \$20,000 for interest on certificates created by the referendum on the general appropriation bills of the last Legislature, \$10,000 for bank examiner, \$18,000 for Supreme Court Commissioners and \$25,000 for a state lighting plant.

OVER A MILLION FOR LUXURIES

The total of all these new expenditures is \$1,154,000. This sum represents improvements and what may be called conveniences and luxuries that heretofore have been dispensed with. Other expenditures authorized by the Legislature at this session are:

Owing to the large total of appropriations of this session, the Governor is known to be strongly disposed to veto the Johnson road bill. This bill provides a one-half mill tax annually on the assessed valuation of the state for the purpose of aiding construction of roads. This money is to be allotted to the counties, no more than \$20,000 to each county in one year. The money is to represent one-third of the cost of road building, the other two-thirds to be paid by benefited property-owners and by the county in equal proportions. Another bill which the Governor may veto is that carrying \$6,000 for the Monmouth and \$27,000 for the Drain Normal Schools, a total of \$33,000. The Drain Normal appropriation was put on the Monmouth appropriation as a rider on the House at the instance of Representative Jackson of Douglas, the home of the Drain institution.—Oregonian.

"While Union and Willamette county representatives, would much liked to have seen the Irrigation bill and a few other bills passed by the legislature which has just adjourned, still the recent session of the legislature was a practical one," said Hon J. H. Dobbins, joint representative from Willamette and Union counties, today, who has just returned from Salem. Union county and the region of Oregon near Milton, would have especially profited by this bill.

"There was a large appropriation but the state is growing and much more money than was appropriated could be used to great advantage."

"Yes, we stopped the clock again, and it was but a minute or two of twelve o'clock, Saturday night when the session really ended. Several of the solons had returned to their homes, but actual business lasted until nearly twelve the following evening."

The genial representative found time while waiting for the train to take he and his family, who have spent the past week in Salem, to their homes, to rehearse some of the things which he would like to have become laws, and comment on those which did. The banking law was a desirable piece of legislation and while the reapportionment bill which was passed, does not affect the 24th representative district still Eastern Oregon will be better represented from now on. Baker county will have a representative of its own.
