# LACHNER IS POSTMASTER IN BAKER CITY

Baker City, Feb. 26.—William J Lachner will succeed D L Moomaw as postmaster at Baker City. Word was received from United States Senator Fulton to that effect yesterday. Senator Fulton states in his message that owing to the fact that Mr. Lachner was the most numerous endorsed of all candidates for the position, he placed his name in the hands of the President for appointment.

It will probably be about two weeks before Mr. Lachner takes charge of the office. He will receive official notification of his appointment by mail at which time he will secure his bondmen and return his bond to Washington. Upon receipt of his bond the department will issue his commission, the arrival of which will place him in charge of the postoffice.

There were numerous applicants for the position to which Mr. Lachner is appointed, among them W J Patterson, J E Hale and Former Postmaster Potter. William H Packwood, Sr., was a candidate for the appointment immediately after the announcement of the retirement of Mr. Moomaw, but withdrew his name from the race.

### COMMISSION IN SESSION

Salem, Feb. 25.—The railroad commission met in its first official session yesterday. A big list of applications for clerkship and secretary were presented. No action was taken regarding chairman or secretary. It is very probable the chairmanship will go to T K Campbell.

The commission wishes an Eastern Oregon man for secretary, if possible. Burdett has withdrawn.

When the commission organizes permanently it will commence hearings in different parts of the state to hear complaints of car shortage and discrimination.
