Day length, 9 hours, and price per day \$5.	
Hauling rock from Proebstel quarry	80c per perch
Hauling rock from Smith's quarry	\$1.00 per perch
Brick from Kreiger brick yard	\$1.00 per thousand
Lumber from Perry	\$1.50 per thousand
Lumber from Summerville	\$3.50 per thousand
For hauling sand	\$1.00 per yard
For hauling gravel	\$1.00 per yard

The size of jump boards is to be 10 feet long, 12 inches deep. For plowing, \$2 per acre or fraction thereof. For excavation with scraper 25c for dirt, 30c for gravel. Scavenger work to be \$1 per load.

Every man belonging to their union shall be subject to a fine of \$5 for the first offence and if he refuses to pay the fine, the rest to quit the job.

HOW A TAR ROOF IS MADE

Regardless of the cold snap which seems to be pending, activity at the new round house continues unabated. Unless snow and sleet falls, the score or more of men now employed will continue to prepare the tar roofing. The roof is to be covered with a composition of tar paper and pebbles that will surely be water proof. On the two-inch planks which form the base, a covering of dry paper is laid. On this again, is a three ply covering of tar paper. Like shingling, so with placing the tar paper. The first strip is laid at the lower edge of the roof. A coating of hot tar along the upper edge of this strip is all that is necessary to hold the next strip in place. A lap-over of ten inches is allowed each strip. This in itself, is enough to shed water but to make it possess lasting qualities, still another precaution is taken. When the section of roof has been covered with the tar paper, hot tar is spread over the entire surface and in this is worked tiny pebbles to the thickness of more than inch. When the tar cools, a solid composition consisting of paper, tar, more tar and pebbles is the result.

Car loads of pebbles are shipped to LaGrande and unloaded on the ground. From these bigheaps of tiny rocks, workmen shovel full wheelbarrows. A hoist, operated by a man and horse, lifts the loaded barrow to the roof where other workmen wheel it away to where the rocks are needed.

Dozens of barrels of tar have arrived. These are unloaded near a huge heating apparatus which converts the nearly solid material into a running fluid. When in this state it is dipped up in buckets, which in turn are rapidly hoisted to the roof and poured on the paper.

Several sections of the huge roof are already covered with the paper and ready for the coating of tar.

CITY ELECTION NOTICE

Notice is hereby given, that the annual city election for the City of La Grande, Oregon, will take place in said city, on the 11th day of March 1907, and that the polls for such election will be open from the hour of eight o'clock a. m. until seven o'clock p. m., said day.

That said election will be for the purpose of electing the following named officers:—

One mayor, one city recorder, one city marshal, one city treasurer, one councilman from the first ward, of said city, one councilman from the second ward, of said city, one councilman from the third ward of said city, and one councilman from the fourth ward, of said city.

That there will be submitted to the tax paying voters of said city the following proposition to voted upon:—

Shall the council of the city of La Grande, Oregon be authorized to issue a \$150,000.00 additional water bonds of said city for the purpose of constructing a pipe line to convey the waters of Beaver creek, to the city reservoir of said city for domestic purposes, said bonds to be sold for not less than their par value, and to bear not to exceed five per cent interest per annum.
