STETSON'S 'UNCLE TOM'S CABIN'

The coming of Stetson's "Uncle Tom's Cabin" on Saturday, March 2 to the Steward's opera house reminds the writer of the firm hold songs, as well as the old play, as on public favor. It is a fact that none of the popular songs of late years survive a "May fly's" existence. They catch the lip but do not hold the heart for, unlike the old tunes, they have been written to catch the passing fancy—they are not birthmarked with the joys and woes of human race. So, too, is it with the old plays, and certain it is that no story-between boards, or on the boards, will ever take so lasting a hold on the American public as Harriet Beecher Stowe's unrivaled sketch of incidents during an epoch that will always mark United States history.

CITY ELECTION NOTICE

Notice is hereby given, that the annual city election for the City of La Grande, Oregon, will take place in said city, on the 11th day of March 1907, and that the polls for such election will be open from the hour of eight o'clock a. m. until seven o'clock p. m., said day.

That said election will be for the purpose of electing the following named officers:

One mayor, one city recorder, one city marshal, one city treasurer, one councilman from the first ward, of said city, one councilman from the second ward, of said city, one councilman from the third ward, of said city, and one councilman from the fourth ward, of said city.

That there will be submitted to the tax paying voters of said city the following proposition to be voted upon:

Shall the council of the city of La Grande Oregon be authorized to issue a \$150,000.00 additional water bonds of said city for the purpose of constructing a pipe line to convey the waters of Beaver creek, to the city reservoir of said city for domestic purposes, said bonds to be sold for not less than their par value, and to bear not to exceed five per cent interest per annum.

Fourth ward, Geddes Bros. store. Judges, T. J. Hughey, H. C. Montgomery and B. Logsdon. Clerks, C. J. Vanderpool and John Hall.
