They have given United States Senator Charles W. "My petition will be circulated immediately after the registration books are opened," said the senator. "Those who sign the petition, of course, must be registered voters, so there is no use in circulating the petition until the registration opens.

"I will not spend a cent in my campaign other than the expense of preparing the petition. I cannot afford to spend money for the position and do not believe in such practices. If my record of six years in the senate is not sufficient to warrant my return, well and good. It is a great honor to be sent to the senate, but it only becomes an honor when the people wish to send a man there, not when he has to buy his way in. I have no sack to spend. My candidacy is entirely in the hands of the people of Oregon."

Speaking of the appointment of a United States district attorney to succeed W. C. Bristol, the senator declared that the delegation has not decided on anyone.
