NEW YEAR'S OBSERVED AT THE WHITE HOUSE

Washington, Jan. 1.—One of the most brilliant functions held at the White House in years was the New Year's reception of President and Mrs. Roosevelt today. Between the hours of 11 and 1:30 the chief executive and the first lady of the land shook hands with over 8000 persons.

Members of the diplomatic corps, in brilliant uniforms, hob-nobbed with cabinet members, army and navy officers, national and district government officers, senators and representatives and the plain people of the national capital.

President Roosevelt occupied a place near the door at the head of the receiving line. On the right was Mrs. Roosevelt, to her right Mrs. Fairbanks, and so on down the line, the ladies of the cabinet taking their positions in order of their precedence. Behind them stood Vice-President Fairbanks and the members of the cabinet.

Heading the diplomats, who were received first, was Baron Mayer des Planches, ambassador from Italy, the dean of the corps, followed in turn by the ambassadors from Austria, France, Germany, Brazil, Russia,

Japan, Mexico and Great Britain and the ministers and other diplomatic dignitaries from other countries.

Following the diplomats came the representatives of the supreme court and the judicial bench of the Washington government, Chief Justice Fuller being given precedence. Then came the officers of the army and navy, in gay uniforms, Admiral Dewey leading the latter. The general and staff of the district national guard followed.

Shortly afterward the members of the cabinet and their wives left the White House to hold receptions at their own homes, while President and Mrs. Roosevelt alone received and greeted the great throngs of distinguished citizens who assembled in the blue room to pay their respects to the head of the nation, and wish him and Mrs. Roosevelt a happy New Year. Miss Ethel Roosevelt, charmingly but simply gowned, was a center of interest, owing to the fact that she will soon make her social debut. The other Roosevelt children also witnessed the reception. Many children were in line when the doors were thrown open to private citizens, and all were heartily greeted by the president and his wife.

COL. MULHALL RETIRES.

Served Time Once, But Was Pardoned—Position Abolished.

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 1.—Colonel Zach Mulhall, the famous Oklahoma ranchman, who has been livestock agent of the Frisco railway system for many years, retired from that position today. The position will be abolished. Colonel Mulhall and his daughters, Lucile and "Booie," the famous "cow girls," are known throughout the country. During the world's fair here Mulhall went on the warpath and "shot up" the Pike, wounding three men. He was sentenced to three years in prison, but was later freed. Colonel Mulhall resides at Mulhall, Okla., where he has a large ranch.

BEER GOES UP.

One Dollar Per Barrel Means an Increase of \$10,000,000.

New York, Jan. 1.—An advance of \$1 a barrel in the wholesale price of beer was put into effect today by the larger beer brewers' broad of trade, and a similar increase has been made by the New Jersey brewers. Owing to the raise in price, smaller glasses will be used in most bars. Higher prices of raw materials is given as the reason for the increase. It is stated that malt has increased from 62 cents to \$1.25 and other materials in proportion. About 10,000,000 barrels of beer are consumed annually in New York.

IN UTAH.

Fuel Companies Recently Indicted to Be Tried Tomorrow.

Salt Lake, Utah, Jan. 1.—Hearing in the case of the Utah Fuel company and various individuals, indicted by the United States grand jury for alleged fraudulent methods of securing ownership of mineral lands, is set for tomorrow in federal court here. Several prominent railway officials are involved in the charges.

NOT SATISFIED.

Indians Will Proceed to Make Their Own Laws.

Tishomingo, Okla., Jan. 1.—"The state? We are the state." So declare the malcontents among the redmen of the Chickasaw nation, who will gather at Tishomingo, the capital, this month, to convene the tribal legislature. The Indians will defy the newly organized state government of Oklahoma and will proceed to make their own laws, in accordance with their old tribal standards.

It Enforced.

Santa Fe, N. M., Jan. 1.—All of the gambling houses in New Mexico are closed today and will remain so, if the provisions of the new anti-gambling law, which went into effect today, are rigidly enforced.

Licenses Required.

New York, Jan. 1.—New York state

ceased to be a Gretna Green today, when the new marriage law went into effect. Hereafter no marriages may be performed in the state without a license. This provision will serve to prevent secret marriages, for which New York has been famous in the past.
