NEW TRIAL FOR BARTLETT

The supreme court has granted ex-Councilman E. W. Bartlett, who was tried jointly with ex-Councilman S. A. Gardiner, and convicted of extortion and who was sentenced to 10 months in the county jail. Gardiner served his time, but Bartlett made a motion for a new trial, which was denied by the presiding judge, William Smith, from which decision Bartlett appealed and the supreme court granted him a new trial, which in all probability will be heard at the February term of court. This may prove to be a more interesting trial in some respects than the first, as it is understood that Gardiner will testify in a different manner than before. The following is the position taken by the supreme court: The defendants were charged with ening to accuse certain persons with gambling and to prosecute them therefor. At the trial defendants testified in their own behalf and in instructing the jury the court said that "you are not bound to consider the testimony of defendants as absolutely true, nor as equal to testimony of disinterested witnesses. You are to bear in mind that the defendants speak in their own behalf to discharge themselves of a criminal accusation, and you are to consider the great temptation which one so situated is under, so to speak as to procure his acquittal."

The court holds that this language "seems to leave an implication that it was incumbent upon the jury to consider the defendant's testimony as false, and for that reason to reject it." Hence new trial is ordered.

Thompson made his money in steam boating on the Columbia river, and for many years received \$100 per ton on all freight carried. After the success of this undertaking he, with J. C. Ainsworth, S. G. Reed and D. F. Bradford, incorporated the old well known Oregon Steam & Navigation company, which operated for years between Portland and Umatilla, and later was absorbed by the O. R. & N. company.
