#### ANOTHER "JACKPOT" STORY.

Mayor Johns Gives His Views on the Full Meaning of the Term.

When the Portland Oregonian complained of ignorance relative to the term "jackpot," it elicited the sympathy of some who would have that paper fully informed on such terms. James A. Fee of Pendleton, has offered his explanation, and now Mayor Johns of Baker City writes the Oregonian as follows:

I have been patiently waiting for one of my associates to give the Oregonian the desired information as to what is meant by "jackpot."

Under the facts stated by him, I do not think Dr. Moore makes a correct use of the term. He is quoted as saying that all the fees paid to the state medical board are placed in a "jackpot" and divided equally among the members. This must be sui generis with the medical board. It is certainly an exception to the rule to have an equal division of the funds in a "jackpot."

I am at a loss to know why the Oregonian should refer this question to eastern Oregon. Judging from the past, it is very apparent that people in eastern Oregon have but little knowledge about "jack-pots."

Personally, my own knowledge has been limited and very expensive. According to my understanding of the term, about two years ago I got into a "jack-pot" with my friends Mrs. Withycombe, Mr. Geer, Mr. Schielbrede and the late lamented Harvey Brown. I have always thought that "pot" was mine until Brown came in and that then both Mr. Withycombe and Mr. Geer, etc., run out on me.

In my judgment, when a republican becomes a candidate for a primary nomination to a state office, he will get into a "jack-pot," especially if he is an eastern Oregon man. While I think the Oregonian and my other friends for honorable mention as a candidates for congress, I have no desire at this time to get into another "jack-pot"—and prefer to practice law and live in Baker City.

#### LIKE OLD TIMES.

Pounding Out Gold With a Mortar and Horn Spoon.

It was a typical scene of the good old days of '49, when J. F. Logue, known the world over as "Shorty," was this morning industriously reducing a large chunk of decomposed quartz, in a mortar securely held between a pair of mining boots. This quartz was taken from the mine in which he is jointly interested with Master Mechanic J. T. Langley, Martin King of this city, and Martin Kern of Boise. The mine is located within a few miles of the famous Boise basin in Idaho. #### TOO MUCH MOISTURE.

Evaporated Apple Men Attack Constitutionality of the Law.

Rochester, N. Y., Jan. 10.—Manufacturers of evaporated fruit to the number of several scores are in attendance today at the annual meeting of the Western New York Evaporated Fruit association. The session will extend through tomorrow. The association has a membership of 300 in the fruit district of western New York. The principal matter of interest before the convention is the amendment of the moisture law. This makes the dealer equally responsible with the manufacturer for the condition of the product. The association will work for other amendments to the moisture law and it is said its constitutionality will be attacked. E. W. Catchpole of North Rose is president of the association, which is the lead-

ing organization of its kind in the east.

#### WERE TOO SLOW.

Railroad Has a Valuable Franchise Taken Away From Them.

New York, Jan. 10.—Because of dilatory tactics in beginning practical construction work, the franchises of the New York, Westchester & Boston and the New York & Port Chester railways will probably be declared forfeited by the board of estimate and appointment at its meeting today. The companies are alleged to be owned by the New York, New Haven & Hartford, by reason of its recent purchase of the Millbrook company, a holding company. The franchises of the two companies were granted in 1902, and the intention was to build a six-track railroad between New York and Boston. Since then less than \$1,000,000 worth of construction work has been done.
