# WISCONSIN FARMERS TRUST GAINS IN MEMBERSHIP

Eau Claire, Wis., Jan. 14.—Wisconsin members of the American Society of Equity, known as the "farmers' trust," met here today in annual convention. Definite action for the elimination of the middleman in business will be taken and a fight for increased prices for farm products will be commenced. Secretary S. D. Kump reports that the society now has about 20,000 members in Wisconsin, a gain of 7000 in the last year. The launching of an official paper to be owned and controlled by the state union is one of the matters before the conven-

tion. The tobacco department of the society, which is the most important in Wisconsin, have decided that all tobacco not sold by tomorrow shall be sized, boxed and placed in pool, to be held for higher prices. The minimum prices determined on are 15 cents for the best grade, 12 1/2 cents for the medium grade and 10 cents for the poor grade. Arrangements have been made for financing the pools and for tendering financial assistance to those who would otherwise be unable to hold their crops.

## WALLOWA TOWNS

Preparing Themselves in Case the County Goes "Wet" in June.

If Wallowa county goes wet next June, not to exceed three saloons will be permitted to run in Enterprise and each will pay not less than \$1000 a year license. No curtains, carpets, painted windows, tables, card playing, pool tables or other adjuncts will be permitted. That was the sentiment expressed at council Wednesday night, when the matter was brought up on request by the mayor. City Attorney Hill was directed to prepare an ordinance. This is done not because the members believe the wets will win, but to be prepared in case they do. Joseph is also going to have an ordinance restricting the number of saloons.

The petitions for local option liquor election were distributed this week by L. W. Riley. Ten per cent of the number of voters at the last general election is required, but Mr. Riley says they will secure 200 names for good measure, 60 each in Enterprise and Wallowa, and 40 each in Joseph and Lostine.—News-Record.

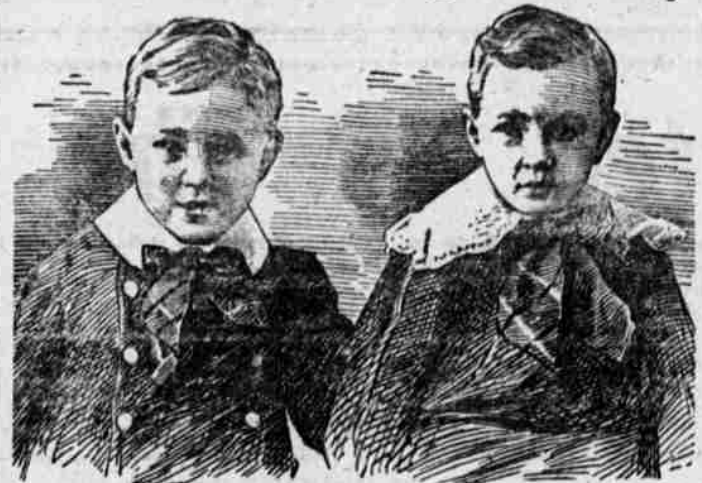
