# HARRIMAN'S REGIME IS PROFITABLE

New York, Jan. 15.—So inconspicuously placed is the just-issued annual report of the Union Pacific that it has attracted little or no attention, is a comparison of the company's condition and operations in 1898 and in the closing year of the decade of the Harriman management competed last year. Using round figures, this shows an increase of gross receipts of from \$33,000,000 in 1898 to \$87,500,000 in 1907. The company's net earnings in the same time have increased over \$31,000,000.

Fixed charges increased from \$4,500,000 ten years ago to \$11,500,000 in 1907. Since then there has been a steady decrease, and under this

heading the total for last years is reduced to \$8,650,000. While dividend disbursements in 1907 amounted to over 20 millions more than were paid in 1898, Union Pacific's net surplus for the year increased from \$7,500,000 to \$12,500,000, the largest in the history of the company.

Since the reorganization of 1898 the Union Pacific and its Oregon lines have increased the average number of tons carried one mile per mile of road from 410,758 tons to 1,010,543 tons, or 250 per cent. The same comparison of passengers carried shows an increase in the ratio of nearly 3 to 1 or from 42,854 to 129,520.

# ROGUE RIVER FRUIT INTERESTS FLOURISHING

Portland, Ore., Jan. 15.—After marketing the most profitable fruit crop ever produced in the state, Rogue River growers have begun the planting of apple, pear and peach trees on a scale that will double the crop of this section. The record-breaking prices paid in eastern markets for Oregon fruit is responsible for the planting of 7000 acres with half a million trees this winter. Only 2500 acres of new orchards were set out last year.

Of the estimated total of new trees 225,000 are pear, 175,000 apple, and 100,000 peach trees. At the bearing stage these trees in one season would produce a crop worth \$3,000,000, if the growers received only \$1 a bushel, which is far below the prevailing prices for Oregon fruit. By keeping up the reputation of its output to the highest mark, the apples and pears grown in the Rogue River section now command the highest prices in home and foreign markets.

**Accident Led to Marriage.**  
 New Haven, Conn., Jan. 15.—An accident on the golf links of New Haven, resulting in a romantic attachment, culminated today in the marriage of Miss Helen Carrington of this city, former woman's national golf champion, and Burnside Winslow of Philadelphia, captain of the Yale baseball team for two years. The ceremony was performed at the residence of the parents of the bride, Mr. and Mrs. John B. Carrington, in Whitney avenue.

The romance of Mr. and Mrs. Winslow began when the Philadelphian, then a Yale freshman, was struck and stunned by a golf ball hit by the young woman. Explanations and apologies followed, an acquaintance was formed which ripened into love and the couple became engaged before Mr. Winslow's Yale course was half completed.

**Provincial "Hello" System.**  
 Winnipeg, Man., Jan. 15.—Government ownership of telephones became a reality today, when the provincial government formally assumed the ownership and control of the Manitoba "hello" system formerly owned and operated by the Bell Telephone company. The system will be operated by a commission. Most of the present active officials of the company will be retained, as they have shown themselves competent. The price paid for the system, according to the statement of Premier Roblin, was \$3,300,000, and, in addition to this, the province has purchased a share of the

equipment to the extent of \$100,000 more. Payment was made in 40-year 4 per cent bonds.

**Horticultural Society.**  
 Portland, Ore., Jan. 15.—The second day's session of the Oregon State Horticultural society convened in this city this morning to hear the address of President W. J. Kerr of the Oregon Agricultural college. Other speakers of the day will be A. I. Mason of Hood River, E. H. Shepard of Hood River, H. C. Bushnell of Junction City, and E. L. Smith of Hood River. Election of officers takes place this afternoon.
