The Motor and the Cobbler.

A few people throw their shoes away when they feel that their feet are getting too close to nature; others take them to the old cobbler around the corner and have them regoled; a few re-tap their own shoes, The ancient cobblers still toil away in every city and village, sitting upon the low "seat," protected with leathern apron and using the same old flatfaced hammer, lasts and awis of the first shoemakers. But modern machinery is fast driving the cobbier from his seat. Machines driven by electric motors are now being lastalled

in repair shops and shoes are "tapped" while you wait. The modern cobbler's shop is equipped with machines such as are used in factories and the worn shoes can be re-soled in a few minutes and at considerable less cost than by the old hand method.
