Irish Members to Meet.

London, Jan. 15.—In response to a summons issued by Mr. Redmond, the Irish members of the house of commons will hold an important meeting tomorrow, which may have a profound effect upon the achievement of the hoped-for unity of the Irish nationalists.

It is possible that the meeting may result in a settlement of the differences between the Redmond and the O'Brien factions. This was thought to have been secured some time ago by the arrangement between Redmond and O'Brien, but the union failed of fulfillment. The O'Brienites demanded the immediate holding of a convention to discuss various matters affecting the party, at the same time stipulating certain conditions. Mr. Redmond refused the demand, holding that the proposal implied censure of the present nationalist organization. He contended that the campaign for a convention made for strife, rather than unity, and called a meeting of the Irish members for tomorrow, at which the plans for the union will be fully threshed out.

Northwest Hardware Men.

Spokane, Wash., Jan. 15.—Delegates from Washington, Oregon and Idaho are in attendance at the annual meeting of the Inland Empire Implement and Hardware Dealers' association, which convened here today. The dealers report fairly prosperous trade conditions in all parts of the inland empire. Representatives will be selected to attend the meeting in Portland next week of the newly organized Pacific Federation of Retail Hardware and Implement associations at which all states west of the Rocky mountains will be represented.

Bryce to Address Lawyers.

New York, Jan. 15.—Hon. James Bryce, the British ambassador, has accepted an invitation to deliver an address before the New York State Bar association a week from Friday night. His subject will be "The Methods and Conditions of Legislation." A reception will be given in his honor following the speech. Joseph H. Choate, president of the association, will preside at the meeting, which will be its regular annual session.
